THE HEBREW REFUGEES. A Card of Thanks to the Good People of St. Paul. Language is inadequate of expressing my gratitude to the good citizens of St. Paul, for their liberality and kindness which they have bestowed upon the unfortunate refugees now in our city.

My appeal for aid has been responded to in the most liberal manner. There has been furnished to me a large supply of clothing, which has been distributed among that people as soon as it was in my possession.

It would have made the generous donors rejoice if they could have witnessed the good it has accomplished, and the gratitude of that people to exchange their autumn, light clothing, for heavier ones, suitable to the cold season.

These refugees arrived here some months ago in a most deplorable condition. Everything to start in life had to be furnished to them. We can never forget the kindness of our citizens to aid and assist us at that time.

Our own people have done everything possible for their relief, but considering that we had in this city nearly six hundred of these refugees, who have lost everything they possessed by the cruel hand of persecution, we could not have accomplished as much as we have, if our good citizens would not have so liberally assisted us.

THE CHRISTIANS. The General Board of Missions of the Church—Officers Elected—Yesterday's Proceedings. LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 20.—The general board of missions of the Christian church is holding its most successful convention here this year.

More than eight times as much has been raised and pledged than that of any previous meeting. Last night \$5,000 was contributed to home missions. Officers elected to-day are: President, Dr. Bangan, Iowa; vice presidents, J. E. H. Nessler, New York; J. S. House, Kentucky; J. H. Garrison, Missouri; corresponding secretary, Robert Moffit, Ohio; recording secretary, W. H. Draper, Indiana; E. L. Power, District of Columbia; W. S. Haines, Illinois; treasurer, Joseph Smith, Jr., Ohio; auditor, W. T. Dickerson, Ohio.

Close of the National Cotton Planters' Convention—An Exposition to be Held in 1884. LITTLE ROCK, Oct. 20.—The National Cotton Planters' association to-day resolved to hold a World's Centennial Cotton exposition in 1884, that year being designated because of the seizure by the king of England in 1784 of eight bales of cotton as contraband, it having been charged that America could not produce so large a quantity.

It was decided to establish a Planters' and Farmers' Mutual Life Insurance company, and resolutions were adopted urging that the commissioner of agriculture be made a cabinet officer; approving the plans of the Mississippi river commission, and thanking the president and congress for their action; asking a reduction of the tariff and appointing a committee, one from each state, to consider the proposition to establish a cotton and land syndicate, and for an alliance between Manchester spinners and American cotton growers.

The next annual meeting will be held in Vicksburg, the time to be determined by the executive committee. Adjoined.
