

MRS. JAMES SMITH, JR.

ACCUSED OF RAPE.

Death of an Estimable Lady. The Globe has the sad duty this morning of announcing the death of Mrs. Elizabeth Smith, wife of Hon. James Smith, Jr. The sad event occurred at Wyoming, a resort on the St. Paul & Duluth branch to Taylor's Falls, at 6:40 o'clock yesterday morning.

Notice of the death was promptly sent to this city, and a special dispatched by the St. Paul & Duluth road, of which Mr. Smith is president, to bring the family, with the remains of the deceased, to the family residence, 539 DeWitt street, where they arrived about 1 p. m. Deceased was united in marriage to Mr. Smith in the spring of 1847, at Mt. Vernon, Ohio, of which place she was a native, her maiden name being Elizabeth Morton.

She died in the city of St. Paul in 1892, which has ever since been their home, and with the history and development of which the bereaved and stricken husband has been most prominently and honorably identified. Deceased was a home woman in the truest and broadest sense of the term, though while making home bright and cheerful—the brightest spot of all for her little household—she could always find time to extend her example for good throughout a large social circle, and especially to those in need of a friend.

Her death was a severe blow to her husband, who was a devoted and successful lawyer, and he died in the Catholic faith, and her funeral will be conducted under the auspices and after the forms of the church, the hour and place to be made known hereafter.

Jay McNamara Charged With a Heinous Offense—Held Without Bail. The law recognizes two generic crimes against society. One against property and the other against morality, as it affects the public welfare or person. The most heinous offenses are those adverse to morality. A case in point came to the notice of the police yesterday morning, when a serious charge was preferred against a young man named Jay McNamara, the complainant being a young Swedish girl named Alice Knutsson. She is a domestic, and has been at work at the Clarendon hotel. Yesterday morning she came to the city hall and stated that on Tuesday night McNamara had entered her room and endeavored to have her submit to his advances. She resisted him, when a struggle ensued during which she claims he maltreated her. Falling to fully accomplish his purpose, she claims he took \$10 of her money and decamped. The girl was examined by Dr. Stewart yesterday, who stated that she was not at all injured. A warrant was issued for the arrest of McNamara, and he was brought before the court, being arraigned on the charges of rape and larceny. The hearing was continued to the 25th inst. and he was committed. As the girl's story is denied by Mr. McNamara, and not credited by some, it is only fair that judgment be withheld until after the hearing.
