WASHINGTON, Jan. 30, 1. a. m.—Indications for the upper Mississippi valley, cloudy weather with rain or snow, winds shifting to northwest, stationary rising temperature, rising, preceded in the south and east portions by falling barometer; for the Missouri valley, colder cloudy weather and light snow, northwesterly winds and higher pressure.

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
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
