WASHINGTON, Feb. 23, 1 a. m.—Indications for the upper Mississippi and Missouri valleys, generally cloudy weather, rain and variable winds mostly from east to south in the Mississippi valley, with slight rise in the temperature.

Yesterday afternoon a man who works for Stahlman, at the brewery, had the misfortune to break his legs.

The case of Fred. Althern, charged with obstructing a street, will be heard in the municipal court this morning.

Capt. Clark went down to Red Wing yesterday to watch the outcome of the confidence case of Devine and others.

Wm. Pleiss and Wm. Burke were before the court yesterday, charged with violating the back ordinance. Pleiss will have a hearing on the 26th and Burke on the 27th inst.

The argument in the case of O'Gorman and Richter was begun yesterday, Mr. Heard opening for Mr. Richter, being followed by Mr. Alts. The argument will be continued to-day.

The Howard Lake counterfeiters, Watson and Moore, were before United States Commissioner Cardozo yesterday, and they waived examination, being committed in default of \$1,500 bail each.

Washington's birthday was especially quiet in police circles, not a single arrest taking place during the day or evening, it being a remarkable fact that not even the usual holiday drunk materialized.

The city treasurer's office is to have new desks and counter, the change being a very desirable one. Workmen were engaged on the job yesterday, and when completed the office will look quite neat and nobby.

The deed of that portion of the Hastings & Dakota railroad between South Minneapolis to Benton junction, to the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul company, of date Dec. 28, 1882, was filed with the secretary of state yesterday.

Fire Commissioner Bruer mourns the loss of his infant son, nine months old, who died from compression of the brain at 6:15 o'clock yesterday morning.

Amendments to the articles of association of the Homestead Building society, filed with the secretary of state yesterday, extend the life of the society from fifteen to thirty years, and allows an increase of the capital stock from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000.

The St. Paul "Ideals," the minstrel company par excellence of the country, will leave on the 5 o'clock train this afternoon for Stillwater where they are to perform to-night. The company and visitors from St. Paul will return on a special train after the performance.

Edgar A. Brown, on Thursday evening, as he stepped off the steps of his house slipped and fell backwards, cutting his head quite severely, and rendering him insensible. Dr. Murphy was called, dressed and sewed up the wound, and rendered him as comfortable as possible.

A genteel young fellow named Patrick Moriarty was arraigned before Judge Burr yesterday on the charge of bastardy preferred by a blushing young damsel named Margaret Grace. Defendant denies the soft impeachment and the hearing was set for the 28th inst. He was released on \$500 bail.

Col. Belote, proprietor of the Metropolitan, who had the misfortune to slip and break his left leg near the hip when alighting from his sleigh in front of the capitol when going to the governor's reception Thursday evening, was reported resting easily last evening and doing as well as could be expected.

Prof. Rawson, the champion skater, was at the rink last evening, but owing to the inclement weather the attendance was not as large as it otherwise would have been. The professor will give exhibitions of his skill at the rink at noon to-day, as he is obliged to start for the East early in the afternoon to fill other engagements.

Articles of incorporation of the Minneapolis Bar association have been filed with the secretary of state. Hon. Eugene M. Wilson is the first president; M. B. Koonvee, vice president; Arthur M. Keith, secretary; W. E. Hale, treasurer. The executive committee consists of W. W. McNair, W. R. Cray, W. J. Hahn, P. M. Babcock, and J. G. Woolley.

Articles of incorporation of the American Railway Ditching Machine company, were filed with the secretary of state yesterday. The corporation is located at Minneapolis, and is to be started out with a capital of \$25,000. The incorporators are C. H. Prior, A. M. Sing, Joseph O. Potter, Charles W. Case and Frederick D. Underwood.

Yesterday afternoon the district court took up the case of Daniel Egan, administrator of the estate of Thomas Egan, against the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba Railroad company, in which action was brought for \$5,000 damages. The son of the plaintiff was killed while coupling cars in the yard of the company in April, 1882. The case is on trial.

A meeting of the St. Paul Presbyterian Alliance was held last evening at the residence of D. W. Ingersoll, Esq., attended by nearly all the members in the presbytery. The principal topic considered by the members present was the commencement of work on Macalester college, the main building of which it is hoped will be under roof before another winter.

The funeral of Prof. Henry Fries took place from the International hotel yesterday afternoon under the auspices of the Masonic fraternity. Will's, Danz's and Wood's orchestras, to which the deceased had belonged, played a beautiful requiem as the coffin was being placed in the hearse, and at Oakland cemetery the favorite hymn of the late musician, "Unter allen whimphen ist ihru," was sung by a

male chorus and the body deposited in its last resting place.

"Squatter Sovereignty" was presented again last evening to a large audience, that was equally as well pleased as the one that greeted it the first time it was presented, on Thursday evening. It is one of those odd, curious, character pieces that grows upon one. All the characters are natural to a hair and perfectly life-like. Miss Josephine was as gushing and overwhelming in her love-making as the circumstances would permit. The play was well received, and the applause was continuous, from beginning to end. This afternoon it will be given at the matinee, with the full strength of the company.

Some time during Thursday night burglars entered the office of Ald. John Dowland, corner of Fifth and Wabashaw streets. Entrance was obtained through a window in the rear of the office, and in gaining admittance the burglar broke one of the window lights with his hand. He must have been severely cut about the hands, as the woodwork about the window and the papers, books, etc., in the office were smeared with blood. The key of the safe was obtained from a drawer of the desk, but the burglar did not succeed in opening it. A check book worth \$4 was taken, together with several small articles.
