

STILL DECLINING.

No Halt in the Downward Course of the Grain Markets.

WHEAT AND CORN OFF THE PINS.

An Active Selling Trade Forces Prices Down to the Bottom.

PROVISIONS WEAK AND LOWER.

Quite an Active Business in Stocks on Wall Street.

CHICAGO.

Chicago, April 9.—It would seem that prices had not yet reached their level on change. The bright weather and lower Eastern prices and European markets had a depressing influence.

On the board wheat was active, and the feeling very unsettled and weak. The receipts were fair, but the principal reason assigned for the weakness was the weather.

There is nothing to note in the flour trade. Business was even more than usually dull, if such a thing were possible with the demand next to nothing, for all grades.

Corn was active on speculative account, and a fair shipping movement also existed. The feeling was greatly unsettled, and prices subject to numerous fluctuations.

There was a weak feeling noticeable in oats. Trading was confined to No. 3, of which there were fair offerings, and buyers were scarce.

For barley the speculative market was quite active early in the session. At that time with wheat and corn weak and quite free sellers of future oats, prices declined so as to reach a point 1/2 to 1/4 below the closings of Saturday for the principal futures.

Provisions are unsettled, and a weak feeling prevailed in the market for hay products during the early part of the day and prices declined materially on all the leading descriptions.

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
