The Democratic primaries for the selection of delegates to the city convention to be held at 10 a. m., Wednesday will be held at the several voting places from 5 to 7 o'clock this evening.

Frank B. Bass has sold to William H. Eustis, Holman R. Drew, Francis A. Chamberlain and Robert Hamlin, Minneapolis, the north half of the southeast quarter of section 17, town 29, range 23, containing eighty acres, for \$14,000.

The subject of which Joseph Cook speaks next Saturday will permit him to bring out all his characteristics as an orator and polemic, and his recent experiences in his trip round the world. It will be intensely entertaining as well as instructive.

The office of Collector Bickel is full of business these days making out license renewals, the receipts from this source yesterday being about \$2,500. The receipts of the office from the sale of stamps and other sources for the day were also about \$2,000.

The usual gang of Sunday drunks and disorderlies appeared in the municipal court yesterday morning. They were eighteen in number, of whom three went to the workhouse for twenty days, while seven others contributed the sum of \$70 to the city's finances.

Officer Gorman warned him to move on, but as he wouldn't move on, the officer assisted him to that station, where he was booked for being drunk and disorderly.

David Richardson, of La Crosse, a veteran of the Third Minnesota battery, received his back pension of \$2,020 at the adjutant general's office yesterday afternoon, added to which is to be an allowance of \$20 per month in the future. The other allowances were received in back pensions, which brought the sum up to a total of about \$3,000 for yesterday.

A team of young horses belonging to Joseph Gruber, left unhitched by him yesterday morning while he went into Mike Cummings' saloon, 83 West Third street, ran away and collided with a nearly new black standing at the Washington street front of the Metropolitan, belonging to John F. Alexander, which they knocked into kindling wood and old iron. It will take about \$500 to pay the damages, perhaps more.

DRY GOODS.

S. F. Alberger, Esq., of New York state, who recently went to Mankato for the purpose of examining the clays in that vicinity, with a view to establishing a drain tile pottery, writes Secretary Young, of the state board of immigration, that he has not yet succeeded in finding a suitable clay in sufficient quantity in that vicinity. He says, also, that parties from Buffalo have just purchased sixty acres of land near there, on which they intend to build a cement factory, capable of turning out 500 barrels of cement per day, and hope to have it in operation within three months' time.

At the meeting of the reorganized St. Paul Foundry company, held yesterday afternoon, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Henry P. Upham; vice president, A. H. Among the crowd occupying the prisoners' dock at the municipal court yesterday were John Thornton, Mark Manning and James Pickering, three lads ranging from twelve to fifteen years old, arrested by officer Murphy while sleeping in a dry goods box. They are boot blacks, Manning and Thornton being from Erie, Pa., and Pickering, a St. Paul boy, but without relations, he claims, eating at the cheap restaurants and sleeping in boxes, hallways, and growing up in a proper condition for treason, stratagem and spoliation. Having committed no crime Judge Burr gave the lads a serious lecture and dismissed them.

The court house commissioners met yesterday afternoon and talked over the matter of the new court house and admired the old plans. Those present were Mayor Rice, County Auditor McCardy, H. R. Bigelow, Wm. Dawson, Dr. Day, C. D. Gillilan and Mr. Hendrickson. Several communications were received from the various city officers informing the commissioners how much room they would want. These were referred to the auditor and Dr. Day to look over. The county auditor is to measure and estimate the rock on court house square that is for sale, and the auditor is to advertise the same for sale.
