WASHINGTON, April 30, 1 a. m.—Indications: For the upper Mississippi and Missouri valleys, slightly warmer, fair weather, followed by local rains, lower barometer and variable winds.

SUDDEN DEATH. F. G. Richter Found Dead in His Place of Business.

Frederick G. Richter a well known citizen of St. Paul, and brother of ex-Sheriff Richter, was found dead in his saloon at No. 89 West Third street, yesterday afternoon. He was last seen by his brother above mentioned, about nine o'clock on Saturday night. A short time subsequently the latter passed the saloon of deceased which was closed, and thinking its proprietor had returned to his residence gave the subject no further thought until the incident was recalled by the discovery of the dead body. Yesterday noon Mrs. Richter became alarmed at the prolonged absence of her husband, who had not returned home Saturday night, and announced her fears to ex-Sheriff Richter. That gentleman at once proceeded to decedent's place of business, and finding the same closed, was unable to effect an entrance. He summoned the assistance of Officer Zwickbach, and after some delay they procured admission into the establishment through a rear door. Immediately they reached an annex to the saloon the form of Mr. Richter was discovered at length upon a sofa, covered with an overcoat and dead. He had evidently been there in that condition for some hours, and there being no marks of violence the conclusion was that he had died a natural death. The remains were at once removed to the late residence of deceased, at 390 Washington street, and rumors were current that it was a case of suicide. Dr. Marcus was summoned and made a post-mortem examination of the body, resulting in the discovery that death was produced by ossification of the heart.

Deceased was born in Bavaria, Germany, in 1839, and emigrated to America during 1858, settling in Milwaukee. He was there engaged in commercial pursuits until the breaking out of the war, when he enlisted in the second regiment of Wisconsin artillery, with which he served until the peace at Appomattox concluded the contest. He came to St. Paul in 1865, where he has since continuously resided. He was a member of Schiller Grove lodge No. 3,
