The Sunday Night Fires. The loss at the Thurston fire Sunday night, was not as large as at first supposed, and the same may be said of the fire at Berkey's stable, the insurance in both instances being about as given in yesterday's issue of the GLOBE.

The horses stampeded from the stables of Nichols and Lay, on Fourth street, during the burning of the Thurston building, were all recovered yesterday. Some vehicles broken by hasty removal and the loss of robes and portions of harness comprise the damage suffered by them.

Chamber of Commerce. The board of directors of the chamber of commerce held its regular meeting yesterday morning. Mr. Noyes called up the matter of the navigation of the Fox and Wisconsin rivers, and the mercantile committee to whom it was referred was given further time.

Mr. McClung called for information in regard to the legal status of the levee, and General Sarnoff stated that he had made an investigation into the matter and found the city had lost none of its legal rights as the railroad held subject to the orders of the city. Mr. Murray said he was tired of acting on the committee, as report after report had been made to the chamber which were laid away and nothing done with them.

At the regular session yesterday afternoon all the members were present but Messrs. Barrett and Terry and the following business was transacted: The following assessments were confirmed: Grading Corborne street from Superior to Cascade street; grading Goodhue street from Lake to Cliff street; grading Third street from Broadway to Kittson street; grading Mendota street from right of way of the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha railway to Seventh street; grading Eighth street from Locust to Kittson street; grading Portland avenue from Western avenue to Dale street; sewer on St. Clair street from Fort street to Toronto avenue; sewer on Jefferson avenue from Fort to Clifton street; sewer on Cedar street from Thirteenth to Bluff street and thence on Bluff street to Grant street; construction of steps on alley between lot 1, block 7, and block W of Robertson's addition to West St. Paul.

The matter of the assessment for grading Bedford street from Minnehaha to North street and Decatur street from Bedford to Prohle street was adjourned to Oct. 29.

It was voted to ask Mr. Thomas Grace to meet the board the 23rd inst. at 3 p. m. The matter of the opening and extension of St. Anthony street from Victoria street to Chatsworth street, was referred to the engineer for plan of land to be taken.

M. Auerbach's assessment for sewers on Summit and Western avenues, was exempted as to thirty-five feet on Western avenue and sixty feet on Summit avenue.

The assessment of G. Dreisel for sidewalks was abated.

The contractor for sprinkling Woodward avenue was notified to put in his appearance before the board Oct. 22.

A Rousing Biermann Meeting.

A rousing Scandinavian meeting was held in Pfeiffer's hall last evening in behalf of the Democratic state ticket and particularly in favor of Bierman for governor.

A resolution was adopted unanimously, pledging all present to vote for Biermann, and to do all in their power to secure his election.
