A grocery team belonging to M. B. Lewis, took fright at the motor yesterday morning on Eighth street, and ran away resulting in the demolition of the wagon.

The Zouave masquerade comes off this evening at Market hall at which the remainder of the series of entertainments will also occur, instead of at Turner hall as previously announced.

The marriage of Dr. E. B. Zier and Miss Minnie Harrison, which was to have been solemnized on Wednesday evening, has been postponed in consequence of the illness of the bride's mother.

The Callender minstrels who opened their entertainment at the Grand last night, paraded the streets yesterday and were observed by thousands who will witness their performances with pleasure.

The manila bearing the poetic name of Nellie Gray paid her monthly fine of \$50 and costs yesterday. Five spotted doves of her institution paid \$10 and costs each, and departed in a hilarious mood.

A youth named Rankin was arrested on the charge of stealing steel skin caps from Simpson & Henderson and Elberich & Tace. The stolen property had been returned to the owners before they knew they had been robbed.

"Major" Snell, the diminutive apple peddler, was before his honor of the municipal court yesterday, to answer to the charge of drunkenness and was fined \$5 and costs, in default of which he was sent to the county jail for ten days to reflect on his folly.

The second ball of the season was given last evening by the Chi Psi society in the new chapter hall on University avenue. About fifty couples from the twin cities attended and danced until the wee hours of the morning.

On the evening of Thursday, the 29th inst., the Cooper's annual ball occurs at Market hall. Invitations are out and are gotten up quite elaborately, being printed on tinted paper in three colors with a cut of a barrel on the end of which are written in red letters the words, "Best XXX."

Charles Wickland was arrested on complaint of Charles Spang for keeping a saloon open for customers on the Lord's day. The case will be heard this morning and doubtless Wickland will pay a penalty for the non-observance of the Sunday law as regards the sale of alcoholic stimulants.

For the past few days complaints are being made against the parties operating teams who haul merchandise from the saloons to the depots without procuring licenses in accordance with the ordinance regulating such traffic. If such parties continue to act in violation of the ordinance they will be arrested and punished.

Wm. Ferguson appeared in court yesterday morning charged with insulting ladies on the street. He entered a plea of not guilty and the hearing of his case was postponed until this afternoon, on the defendant depositing \$25 for his appearance. When the case was called Ferguson failed to respond and his money was forfeited to the court.

A decision was filed by Judge Young yesterday, in the case of H. M. Carpenter and The Motor Line, in which damages are brought in the sum of \$1,000 by reason of expenses, etc., made by the company on plaintiff's land. The judge decided that defendant is not entitled to the relief asked, and that the action must be sent to a jury to determine damages.

Yesterday morning Thomas Gough, who recently arrived in the city with his family, and is residing at 803 Marshall street northeast, had quite a narrow escape from serious injury or death. While in the act of climbing between stationary cars they backed up, catching his feet which he, however, managed to extricate with the exception of the heel on which was produced a badly contused wound. He was conveyed to Dr. Ames' office for treatment.

At the annual meeting of the Second Congregational Church society, Messrs. Wymen Elliott, A. Bode, Albert Adams, A. H. Drake and C. C. Grove were chosen as trustees, and the following as officers of the society for the coming year: president, C. E. Young; clerk, C. B. Tiro, treasurer, O. E. King. As per report of the treasurer, \$2,800 were given in envelopes and contributions at the Sunday morning services during the past year and upward of \$7,500 were for benevolent purposes.

Peter Kelley, a resident of East Minneapolis and employed on the bridge work of the Northern Pacific railway, while putting up a sixty foot derrick yesterday afternoon met with an accident which proved nearly fatal. While on the derrick some of the gearing gave away when he was about thirty feet from the ice, and the derrick and man fell together into the water. He received a gash two inches long over the left eye, and another on the forehead about an inch long, besides numerous bruises over the whole body. Had not his fellow workman gone to his assistance he would have been drowned. Dr. Ames attended to the injured man.

\$30,000 Damages. The suit for damages in the sum of \$30,000 brought by Thomas H. Howland against The St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba Railway company was heard yesterday in the district court before Judge Koon and a jury. The plaintiff who

is a young man, was walking along Washington avenue at its intersection with Fourth avenue north about 10 o'clock on the night of the 14th of last April, and was in the act of crossing the railroad track when he was run against by two freight cars which were being backed up by an engine without the ringing of a bell or the sounding of a whistle or any display of light whatever. As the night was pitch dark he was unable to observe the cars approaching and was knocked down and run over by them, crushing and mangle his two legs in such a manner as necessitated their immediate amputation. The victim of the catastrophe presented a sad appearance in court yesterday as he sat in a little vehicle which is propelled by the use of his arms. Since the accident occurred he has been enjoying a precarious existence by selling little articles on the street and his attorneys Wilson & Lawrence and H. C. Truesdale, are confident of obtaining a verdict in a sum which will place him above want.

A Small Blaze. Early yesterday morning a fire originated from a defective chimney in the boarding house of W. S. Averill, 912 South Fifth street. Household goods were damaged to the extent of \$250, the same being insured for \$1,600. An adjoining building owned by a non-resident named Williams was damaged to about the same extent with no insurance. The firemen worked well and prevented the spreading of the flames.
