St. Paul, Nov., 28, 1883.—Trade during the week has been very steady and regular, and as there has been no noticeable change in quotations there is little occasion for ment. Collections have been steady and, on the whole, satisfactory. Grocer ies have been moderately active. London layer raisens have been advanced, while dried apples have declined a little. Coffee is very firm, and last week it was expected that this week an advance would have to be made, but though all grades are strong and solid, no change is made in quotations, at present. The decline noted last week in sugars still continues. Dry goods are without any special change and business is not over active. Seasonable goods are in some demand and would be more so if we could have continued sharp weather. No dependence, however, can be placed on the weather for the reason that no sooner does a sharp cold day visit us than it is followed by a mild, almost warm one. Hardware is solid and firm, in good demand, with no reductions in quotations, and collections satisfactory. Like groceries and all else the amount of sales is such as to show a good clean increase in the total amount of transactions last year. In drugs, and oils there is

a good degree of activity. while collections are satisfactory. Lard oil, oil lemon and spirits turpentine have declined slightly, otherwise quotations are unchanged. The produce market has fluctuated a good deal during the week but at last ended a shade firmer yesterday than it was a week ago. Wheat, which started last week at 97c, closed yesterday at 98c. Corn during the week advanced 1c and yesterday was quoted at 48c. Oats barely held their own and barley stuck at 55c. Rye advanced 1c. Ground feed, corn meal and bran were without change. Baled hay weakened a little and so did dressed hogs. The financial situation has not changed in any perceptible degree. Money is still in good demand while remittances from the interior have not increased, which shows that the wheat is not moving forward to market. The banks continue to exercise a good deal of precaution in receiving paper and only that which is perfectly satisfactory is taken. [
