A SANE MAN.

Thomas Chambers pronounced sane by the Medical Board of Examiners and discharged.

Dr. Jones and Coroner Fairbairn, after serious deliberation in the matter of the alleged insanity of Thomas Chambers, came to the conclusion that he is of sound mind and in perfect possession of all his faculties, and consequently they ordered his discharge. All who have known Mr. Chambers during his long residence in the city speak of him in the highest terms of praise and agree in saying that he has never manifested any symptoms of insanity. They are outspoken in censuring the wife for her conduct toward him, and commiserate him upon his unhappy lot in being bound to her by matrimonial ties. Mr. Chambers is of the opinion that if he gets rid of the boarders his family relations will again become pleasant, and he is therefore resolved to notify them that their absence from his domicile is desirable and that he shall exercise the prerogatives of the head of the family, and compel his wife to act in conformity with the injunctions of St. Paul, when that apostle of the Gentiles said that wives should be subject to their husbands.

A Trivial Tale.

The divorce case of Alice Mary Hatch vs. Frederick S. Hatch for desertion was heard yesterday before Judge Young and dismissed. Living and Molyneux, the attorneys for the plaintiff, immediately filed a new suit in which the following allegations are set forth: That the parties were married in Blue Earth county, Minn., on the 5th day of June, 1880; that the wife is now nineteen years of age and the husband twenty-four; that the issue of the marriage is a boy named Louis, aged two years and six months; that notwithstanding the fact that the wife proves herself faithful and obedient to the marriage vows the husband wilfully deserted her three years ago without any justification; that he has never since returned and has not contributed anything to the support of herself and child. She therefore asks for the dissolution of the marriage bonds and for the custody of her boy.

A Lascivious Case.

In the municipal court yesterday, was brought up the case against Nellie Bryant who is charged with stealing \$43 from Malcolm Kolme. The examination was continued until next Monday, in \$800 bonds, and in default of the bail, she was remanded to custody. This case led to the arrest, upon the order of Chief Berry, of John Moran and Charles Johnson, upon the charge of keeping a house for immoral purposes, the alleged crime having been perpetrated in their house or saloon at No. 121 North Second street. These defend-

ants will also be given an examination on Monday, and be recognized in deposits in the respective sums of \$100 each.

AMUSEMENTS.

The Grand. Last night the famous Boston Ideal Opera company closed the most brilliant, in point of attendance, week of light opera ever known in this city.
