Sheriff O'Gorman was ordered to go for fastenings to fill a vacancy of one in the making up of a jury in Judge Wilkin's court yesterday, and brought in Peter Pankett at the first swoop, who filled the bill.

Judge Brill dismissed the divorce case of Minnie Lorcher vs. Matthias Lorcher yesterday on motion of the defendant, the two having got together, smoked the pipe of peace and made up their matrimonial differences.

Four new pension claims were filed in the adjutant general's office yesterday, additional proofs forwarded in five others and one allowance of \$8 increase received.

Notice was also received that 30,000 pension claims are awaiting adjudication at Washington.

Suit was commenced in the United States circuit court yesterday by Eugene F. Osborne, against Wm. Rodgers and Thomas Davis, for an injunction restraining them from the use of a patent steam pipe employed for cooking purposes.

Charles Gunn filed a suit in the district clerk's office yesterday against the St. Paul & Manitoba Railway company for \$15,000 damages, on account of injuries received as a brakeman, which caused the amputation of his right leg, by jumping from a train upon a carelessly constructed depot platform at Elk River, Sherburne county, Aug. 13, 1882.
