DATES TO FEBRUARY 24.

Lullaland's Mission from Napoleon to Maximilian—Bushman's capture of the State of Missouri—Sales of Copper Steeples at Chapman by the Chilean War—Northern Pacific Railroad to be Pushed Forward—A Freedmen's Bureau Bill Passed—Progress of the War Against Paraguay—John Bull in the War Against Spain—Russia, England and America in Asia—Twenty-Seven Children Drowned at Celina, Ohio—A State Constitution for Nebraska—A Delegation of Montanians Visit the President—Congressional, etc., etc.

New York, February 23rd.—The Freeman's Bureau bill has finally passed both Houses, the House today concurring in the Senate amendment of yesterday. News from Peru is that Dictator Prado has made a tentative and defensive alliance with Chili and declared war against Spain.

Cincinnati, February 10th.—The Dayton (O.) Journal, yesterday reports that twenty-seven children were drowned in the reservoir, at Celina, on Wednesday. They were attending school in the vicinity of the reservoir, and on school day, the school was in session, and the children were on the ice to slide, when it broke with them. The whole party drowned before assistance could reach them. New York, February 10th.—The following military districts are established: New Jersey, Rhode Island, Connecticut; Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Vermont; District of Maine, and also the Districts of Northern and Western California. It is well known that the Government of the Rio Grande is not worth going to war for. The Panama correspondent of the "Herald" says the combined Peruvian and Chilean fleets is under orders to commence immediate hostilities against Spain, if the latter is not strongly fortified with guns, including eight Blackley's cast-steel three hundred pounders. The monitor Victoria runs also in the front of the batteries are offered by Americans. Torpedoes and other infernal machines for the destruction of the Spanish fleet, have arrived at Callao. They were purchased at New York by an agent of the Chilean Government. It is reported that Valparaiso has no fortifications or armament to resist an attack, and it is hoped no orders have been given for the combined fleet of Peru and Chile to attack the Spanish fleet, but being strong enough they might come to grief. The Spanish fleet is admirably appointed and pronounced among the most perfect of the world. The third article of treaty stipulates that Chile and Spain stipulates that any foreigner in the naval service of either may, if competent, be advanced to the supreme command of either fleet. The "Commercial" says that Chile continues in monetary affairs to be very strong as the result of the deliberations of Congress on the finance bill; apprehension of the unsettled condition during the recess of proposed amendments to the tariff, Treasury, caused a general disposition to avoid contracts extending into the future. Government securities show a steady appreciation. Gold easier and the market amply supplied. One broker having sold about a million of dollars.
