MR. A. J. UELIN, who hails from Bannack, has been in town during the week, and from him we learn that the miners of that section are busily engaged in developing their lead claims. Professor Eaton is in that region, prospecting for fine-flint with which to construct furnaces. The Professor thinks he has found some clay which will answer, although of inferior quality.

SPARRING EXHIBITION.—Billy Dwyer, late of New York city, will give a sparring exhibition on to-morrow evening at the Melodeon Hall. Billy has a big reputation as an "ard'iter." It may be a little more trouble to take it out; but it must be done, if not by the present claim-holders, then by those who may be fortunate enough to purchase or re-locate the mining ground.

MR. BACON, the pioneer expressman from Walla Walla to Helena and Blackfoot City, arrived in town on Tuesday last, making the trip from Lewiston, Idaho, to this place in eight and a half traveling days. From him we learn that the fifty thousand dollars, which were appropriated by Congress some time ago, to construct a wagon road from Idaho Territory to Montana, is now being applied to open a thoroughfare between this city and Lewiston in the former Territory. A Mr. Bird, of Mount Pleasant, Iowa, has charge of the work, and will do all toward completing it that can be done with so small an amount of funds.

IMMIGRATION.—The immigration overland from the Atlantic States has begun to make its appearance. Several trains came into town during the week. Those who have arrived inform us that there are thousands more on the way, and that in the course of three or four weeks there will be more "tender-feet" here than ever came in one batch before. We say, let 'em come. There is no country in the world that offers stronger inducements to immigration than Montana. Our valleys are broad and fertile, our mines rich and extensive, our quartz veins wide and deep; and we say again let 'em come. They will find employment and remuneration therefor accordingly.

SEVERAL ineffectual efforts of the elements to get up a shower or storm of some kind, have been made during the week; but, as yet, without any decided result. Nothing smart has been accomplished, though some drops, precious and quiet as the tears which fall down beauty's cheeks, have descended. The country needs rain—and such weather as we have would be almost unendurable in the States, without it. Later, it did rain notwithstanding the omens and the elements when but nine lines of this item were written, and it did not "come down like the quiet tears down beauty's cheek," but without being prodigal of words or parsimonious of facts we will state that it rained and hailed like the very de-!

NEW BOOK.—We have just received, from H. H. Bancroft & Co., of San Francisco, a copy of a new work, entitled, "The Mormon Prophet and his Harem; or, an Authentic History of Brigham Young and his numerous Wives and Children." By Mrs. C. V. Waite. The book is neatly printed, and illustrated with steel engravings, containing a complete political history of Utah, sketches of the various Federal officers who have represented the United States Government in that Territory; together with an account of the Mountain Meadow Massacre, and various other crimes of human sacrifice, which have been brought about by the revelations of Brigham Young. Bancroft & Company are publishers for the Pacific States. We look upon the book as a just and proper disclosure of Mormon villainy.

Stanton discoverer; the Flint Lock, Silver Star district, recorded July 11th, and the Calm, in same district, same date, Richard Fisher discoverer; the Homer, Silver Star district, recorded July 11th, N. J. Davis discoverer; the Evelyn, Silver Star district, recorded July 9th, Black Eagle, same district, same date, J. A. Smith discoverer. These discoveries were made between Monday morning and Friday noon of this week, and Mr. Hill informs us that it has been a very dull week for recording Quartz Claims.
