LOCAL ITEMS.

KINGDAID'S ox train, six wagons, arrived here on the morning of July 24th, bringing groceries and provisions for Pringts & Russell.

The accused was lodged in the calaboose over night; but upon examination next morning, was discharged by Judge McCullough, for want of corroborative testimony.

On the afternoon of the 26th, one Al. Huntley and a young man named Farrell, had a set-to in the street, growing out of hard words spoken and some belligerent demonstrations by the former. Al. confessed to his misconduct, and was let off with a fine of \$10.
