

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

Charles Sumner is engaged to be married to the widowed daughter-in-law of Hon. Samuel Hooper. The Emperor of Brazil wishes to have a run through the United States, and has so signified his desire to recent visitors from America. The live stock assessed in Iowa this year is: cattle, 700,598; horses, 312,989; mules, 13,751; sheep, 1,353,816; swine, 621,214. Examination of the Tribune books a few days ago showed a total increase in circulation of fifty-three thousand copies since the 1st of August. Our national debt attained its highest figure on the 31st of August, 1865, the amount at that time being \$2,737,689,571. September 1, 1866, the total debt was \$2,595,683,168, a decrease in one year of \$142,006,403. A condensed synopsis of President Johnson's speech at Delmonico's, in New York, of four hundred and seventy-eight words, was telegraphed to Reuter's European Press Association on Tuesday week by the Atlantic cable, at an expense of \$5,019 in gold. A considerable sensation has been created in mechanic circles by the recent discovery of Mr. Henegage of Buffalo, that sheet iron will serve for belting in place of rubber or leather. There are at present nearly twelve hundred convicts in the State Prison of New York at Sing Sing, including many of the most desperate characters, sentenced for long terms of imprisonment. The roof of the Michigan Central Railroad depot, in Detroit, will cover three hundred thousand square feet, or over seven acres. At Niles, Michigan, the platform on which the President, Mr. Seward and others were standing broke down, and the party tumbled with it. Mr. Seward remarked: "This is not our platform," but was answered: "You were standing on it." The French newspapers limit themselves to two lines daily over the Atlantic cable. They get only the price of gold and cotton. The Emperor Francis Joseph, of Austria, first tried entrenching. He is now retrenching, having dismissed a large portion of his retinue. The Oswego Advertiser and Times says: Three monster Dahlgren guns, intended for Fort Ontario, are now lying upon a canal boat in the cove. Their weight is respectively 49,689; 46,460 and 49,675 pounds. Near the butt or breach, they are four feet in diameter, or twelve feet in circumference, tapering off toward the muzzle. The Richmond Whig says of some of the prominent Union men of the nation: "As for the radical leaders, not one of them has any human nature. Sumner is a sheep; Thaddeus Stevens a hyena; Schenck an animal whose name much resembles his own; Wade a vulture; Greeley a scarecrow; Butler a cornucopia; Brown and Underwood harpies; Wendell Phillips a devil; Botts a mule; and among the rest any number of jackasses and other ignoble beasts." Captain Bolton, an Englishman, has invented a new system of telegraphic correspondence, which it is claimed will reduce the trouble and expense of telegraphing fifty per cent. It appears to be a kind of telegraphic shorthand, and to be telegraphing what stenography is to ordinary writing. A strong feature in favor of the improvement is said to be its simplicity. It is adapted to all languages and messages in Chinese, Cherokee, or any other tongue, may be sent accurately, and yet only the parties interested understand them. The court will please observe," said an Arkansas lawyer, "that the gentleman from the East has given them a very learned speech. He has roamed with old Romulus, socked with old Socrates, ripped with old Eripides, and canted with old Cantharides! but what—your honor—what does he know about the laws of old Arkansas?" A two year old bull was picked up at sea, off Chebeague Island, Maine. The animal was five miles from the main land at the spot in the vasty deep where he was overhauled, and was hard on his way to visit his English cousin Johnny. Having been taken in tow, with his nose clear of the brine, Bossy was safely brought to land. In 1812, the first cotton mill, the Yellow Mill, was built in Fall river, and in 1813 the Troy Mill. Both of these were very small mills. In May, 1845, there were six cotton mills in town, running 48,062 spindles. In May, 1865, fifteen mills, running 241,218 spindles. The mills now in process of erection and contracted for, will add about 120,000 spindlers to the above. A Cincinnati says: "Talk about filters! Just drink a quart of Ohio river and stand in the sun for five minutes, and you will find the aforesaid coming out of every pore, beautifully filtered, while your stomach becomes converted into a sand-bag, and you can hear the gravel rattle as you walk." The will of Henry Ames, who died lately at St. Louis, after being helpless from paralysis for six years, is reported to be in substance as follows: \$200,000 to his widow, \$50,000 to her daughter by her first marriage, and \$100,000 to the O'Fallon Institute, which is a liberal institution of learning, something after the plan of the Cooper Institute in New York. The balance of his property goes to his only child, a little boy eight years old. The whole estate is valued at \$1,500,000. A Richmond correspondent of the New York Herald, states positively that the body of Col. Dahlgren, of General Kilpatrick's staff, who was killed in a raid on Richmond, in March, 1864, was never recovered, but that the body given his friends was a fictitious one, palmed off for some purpose unknown. They have a queer way of doing things at Nebraska City, judging from the following card, which appears as an advertisement, in a recent number of the News: "Received of Mr. —, by the hands of Mr. —, \$50 in full settlement and satisfaction for insuring my wife, 'CHARLES BEVERE'." The Buffalo Courier has been detected by the organ of the African M. E. Zion Church in New York—which is conducted entirely by negroes—in appropriating a piece of poetry from its columns which was written by a negro. The journal in question thinks it is bad enough for the Copperheads to abuse the negroes without trying to steal their brains. The first submarine cable ever used was manufactured and laid down in our

own country by one of our own citizens. It was carried across the North River, from New York city to New Jersey, in 1847, and still lies there silently communicating thoughts under the waters. This, and all the other sub-marine cables in the United States, with only one or two exceptions, have been made under the superintendence of Mr. Bishop of the Bishop Gutta Percha Company—and are all in good working order. Du Chaillu, the great African traveler, sends to the London Times some interesting notes on a tribe of pigmies which he discovered in Western Africa. They resemble the gypsies somewhat in their habits, and gain their livelihood by trapping game, which they sell in the villages. They average about four feet six inches in height, and are known as the Oberto. The Bostonians are severe on the liquor sellers, as will be seen from the following: "A shopkeeper of Boston was lately convicted of selling one half gill of whisky, and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 and costs, and to suffer thirty days' imprisonment in the House of Correction, and to give \$1,000 bonds not to violate the liquor law for one year. A dispatch from Mobile says that on the 2d inst., on the Florida coast, fifteen miles from land, an island was thrown up by volcanic influence to the height of ninety feet above the water level, and measuring 1,700 feet in circumference.
