THE BUILDING OF THE PACIFIC RAILROAD ACROSS THE PLAINS.—There has been nothing in all the history of civilization to match the rapid construction of the Pacific railroad from the Missouri river to the Rocky Mountains this year. We give some details that heighten the marvel of the great feat, from the Chicago Tribune:

The first forty miles of track were not laid until January, 1866, and indeed it was the middle of April before track-laying commenced in earnest. From that time the work has gone on with unexampled rapidity. It was literally a race against time, and time has been beaten. Two hundred and ten miles of track have been laid in one hundred consecutive days, excepting Sundays.

During that time the company have erected all their necessary buildings, in the most substantial and perfect style, at the eastern terminus, Omaha. Some idea of the extent of these shops may be gleaned from the fact that they are now turning out there one complete car per diem. On the building of the road, the working force, at times equal to 12,000 men, has been employed. Nine steam saw mills have been put up by the company, and with a dozen others, kept steadily running for work on the road. Two steamboats have been bought, and several others constantly chartered by the company, and a very army of men on the lines of transportation have had the duty all the while of seeing that the material shipped for the road should be hurried along. The actual amount paid in freight on iron alone, during the last year, was \$1,200,000 and as a single item, showing the enormous cost, much of the iron cost forty-six dollars per ton for transportation from the place of purchase to Omaha.

There are already twenty-one locomotives on the line, manufactured at Schenectady, New York; Patterson, New Jersey; Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and Boston, Massachusetts; also about two hundred cars of all kinds. It cost from \$800 to \$1,000 to get each of the locomotives up from St. Joseph to Omaha, a distance of two hundred and twenty-five miles; \$150 to \$175 each for bringing up platform cars, and for the passenger cars, the company had them selves to buy a boat, the Metamora, for their transportation, the river furnishing nothing which could be used for the purpose.

For sixty miles down and one hundred and fifty up the Missouri river from Omaha, all the force which could be obtained has been steadily at work all this year in getting out ties, and now great numbers are being obtained three hundred miles west of Omaha. Those from this last source are all of cedar, an excellent and durable material, and finding them near the line will be a great advantage to the builders of the road. The average cost of ties has been \$1 25 to \$1 50 each. To day the road is 271 miles west of Omaha. It is graded and ready for track laying 100 miles further. The rail is going down at the rate of a mile and three-quarters to two miles per diem, and only about 150 miles further, at most, will bring them to the base of the Rocky Mountains.

DECORATIONS OF CEMETERIES.—Perhaps you are not aware of the custom which remains in France of visiting their cemeteries on All Saints' Day; it is not a little interesting, however, to see the crowds of really dressed common people going in groups through the cemetery grounds, and arranging their floral testimonials on the tombs. Not less than one hundred and fifty thousand visited Pere la Chaise last Tuesday, dressed in their gayest and often peculiar costumes; and the homage thus tastefully paid was by no means confined to the relatives and near friends. Distinguished people, after death, become the heroes and heroines of this holy day. The tombs of Beranger and Alfred de Musset, always beloved in Paris, were richly and profusely decorated, and surrounded by admiring little knots all day; whilst the sentimental portion of the multitudes testified their faith in the duration of mortal love, by covering the tombs (a sweet little Gothic structure) of Abelard and Heloise with plentiful crowns of immortelles. The cemetery of Mont Parnasse was also the resort of a large crowd; and here floral honor was paid to the four heroic "Sergeants of Rochelle," and to Moreau, while at Mont Martre similar graceful tributes were accorded to Cavaignac, Halivvy, and Minger. In the churches, were hung in satin and gold fringe, the banners of the saints; and on either side of the altars beautiful little tabernacles, on which, in miniature chapels and boxes of gilt, were placed saintly bones and teeth, lockets and hair, prayer-books and beads, reputed to have once belonged to the sacred persons canonized by the Mother Church. The patron saint of each church receives especial honors—in fact, a small but exquisitely-adorned temporary altar, devoted especially to himself or herself as the case may be. For instance, in one of the churches I had the satisfaction of seeing a brown and somewhat ancient skull, pasted over with little strips of gilt, and resting upon a magnificent cushion of velvet and gold lace, which, I was informed, was all that yet remained of Saint Francoise, Duchess of Brittany. This relic was placed on a superb tabernacle, hung with rich white satin elaborately embroidered, and especially with a magnificent Eton crown, which glistened with numerous precious stones. Chairs were placed upon this tabernacle and people were kneeling upon them, performing the profane and absurd mummery of praying to this ghastly remnant of mortal clay.

Such performances were going on all over France—nay, all over Europe, on All Saints' Day; and there were intelligent, bright-looking men and women kneeling about these memorials in this nineteenth century.—[Commonwealth.
