

FROM JEFFERSON.
 Mining Interests Looking Up.—Machinery for Leads.—The Copper Mines.
 From our Regular Correspondent.
 EDITOR POST: I have been silent for some time, hoping some one more competent than myself would represent this portion of the Territory, through your columns, believing that as a community we at least deserve a passing notice. The records of Jefferson county bear unmistakable evidence of our merits as good citizens. Our mineral developments present a favorable index of future greatness, and will satisfy many of your readers (who have passed through this section viewing the vacant cabins and dilapidated towns) of our industry and perseverance. This section, which is growing so rapidly into notoriety, has been almost abandoned for two or three years, so far as its quartz interests were concerned; but a glimmer of hope is beginning to gladden the vision and strengthen the arms of the faithful. Among the many leads that are proving valuable (so far as can be tested by assay) is the Gregory, the Alta, the Alta California, the Casket, and many others too numerous to mention. Preparation is being made as fast as possible to erect a furnace and smelter. I am told, upon the Gregory, the machinery being purchased and active arrangements going on for the completion of the work. I promised in my last to tell more about the copper mine at this place. Being an outsider I am not able to give an accurate account of this mine; but judging from the enormous nuggets of native copper taken out (merely as prospects, work being at present suspended on the claim) I am inclined to believe there is a rich thing for capital to work upon. I am informed that as soon as the Company gets some existing differentials there will be machinery immediately placed upon the ground for working the mine.
 So far as crops in this valley are concerned, the prospects are good for both vegetables and grain. The grasshoppers have done but little or no damage.

Terrible Conflagration in Council Bluffs—Over \$300,000 Worth of Property Destroyed—The Nonpareil Office a Total Loss!
 At about twenty minutes past twelve o'clock last night, (Monday) June 24th, one of the most sudden, terrible and threatening conflagrations known in the Missouri valley, occurred in this, our fair and promising city, whilst our inhabitants were wrapped in the peaceful slumbers of the night; and the policeman was making his usual beat on Lower Broadway. Suddenly as he passed the Empire Block, on his westward patrol, he discovered a bright and flashing light, and then a flame burst from the east end of the roof of C. P. Smith's forwarding and commission warehouse. Startled and shocked at seeing a fire in such an unlooked for place, he immediately gave the alarm. All work to subdue the flames was useless, the combustible material in the building, the lack of water, or the instruments to carry it, prevented the staying of the flames. Officer & Pusey's bank, in the rear of Empire Block, was next broken open, its inmate aroused from his sleep, and books, valuable documents, etc., taken therefrom, almost as soon as it takes us to write this. By this time the flames from the warehouse had lit up the sash of the window in the rear of Empire Block, and the Nonpareil office, only fourteen feet from the flames, through its open windows was filled with smoke. An attempt was made to save it, but only six men had the nerve to venture on the fearful task, as it was suffocating from the smoke to venture. At least one hour elapsed after the first alarm before a working crowd of people had gathered.
 At twenty minutes past one, the whole Empire Block was wrapped in a sheet of flame and therein are the deplorable losses we now enumerate independent of the building itself: R. P. Snow, dry goods, \$38,000, insured one-half; Brewster & Co., \$40,000, partially insured; W. H. Pusey, \$10,000, on his part of the building, insured \$5,000; G. A. Robinson, \$4,000, insured \$2,000; Dellaven, \$1,500; Young Men's Library, \$2,000; Meyer, \$10,000, insured one-third; Nonpareil printing establishment, \$6,000; E. I. Woodbury & Co., Dentists, \$2,000, no insurance; Dr. P. B. McKay, \$500, no insurance, balance on office, books, stock and apparel, at least \$3,000. C. P. Smith's warehouse had in store over \$5,000 worth of corn and nearly as much other products; Stewart & Haas had in goods stored in the Empire Block nearly \$11,000 worth. C. J. Fox lost his warehouse and over \$2,000 worth of machinery. J. B. Hoffman's loss amounts to \$10,000, insurance \$6,000; Finley Geesman, druggist, lost \$1,500, whole covered by insurance. Mayor Street sustains a loss of almost \$2,000, including office fixtures of United States Land office.
 The entire amount of buildings destroyed, damaged and injured will not fall short of \$300,000—at least that amount will not make the sufferers good.
 Now to the cause of the fire: Every first visitor at the scene will admit that the fire originated in the east end of Smith's commission house, and at that east end there was an open window that fronted on Main street, where some boys on the night previous were blazing fire-crackers and shooting rockets even unto a late hour. It is therefore fair to suppose that through this re-enactment of the causes of the great fire at Portland, Me., at about this time last year, this like casualty has been produced. We have neither time nor space for comments. Let a candid people discriminate.
