FROM TUESDAY'S TRI-WEEKLY.

A FIGHT FOR LIFE.—From Mr. Goldschmidt, of the volunteers, we have an account of one of the most terrific fights on record. Not with Indians, but with one of their rivals, a Cinnaman man. It appears that a scouting party of ten men from Captain Campbell's company had reached Boulder Creek, fifty miles below the camp of the militia, and were camped for the night. A party of three or four men, who were unknown to the militia, having been discovered in the vicinity. About 150 yards from camp they succeeded in killing a man. A portion of the party stopped to dress him, but the other party, coming unknown, pushed on, and in a couple of hundred yards far raised another huge bear, weighing about 750 lbs. The militia man, who had been hit, was wounded but severely, being only a few feet distant. The third attempt his gun missed fire, and the bear made for him, and before the Sergeant could draw his revolver, the bear had seized and tackled him. The fight was now for life. The grip of the bear was so affectionate that the Sergeant could not draw his revolver, but plunging his hand into his mouth he succeeded in pulling it out, and held his grip. The bear, maddened by the effects of his wounds, used his claws terrifically and while muzzling the hand in his mouth, tore with his sharp claws the side of the man's head until it hung in tatters about his ears. The Sergeant was plunk personified and actually succeeded in drawing his revolver, three times, but he instantly turned and regained his feet. This encounter lasted several minutes. His comrades bearing the shouts started in that direction and on getting sight of the encounter ran as rapidly as possible to his assistance. One of them, a mere boy, reached them just as the Sergeant was getting the advantage and was drawing his revolver with his feet. Plunging his gun against the bear's snout, he gave him the contents. Brain let go the hand, fearfully lacerated, and seizing the muzzle of the gun he held it up like paper. The bear had come and had been killed over to the arms of death. The Sergeant returned to camp, mounted his horse and with one companion rode all night reaching the States. Mr. M. Barker is starting in on train of twenty-eight wagons to Salt Lake for produce.

APPROVED.—We are authorized to state that the Executive of this Territory in regard to the volunteer forces, gave his unqualified approval to the action of Governor Smith, and fully endorsed the measures proposed by him, as indicated in "General Orders." This gives official sanction to the military movements in the Territory, as General Terry is commander of this district. Governor Smith will now proceed with the re-enlistment of troops, and as "active service" is desired, and Colonel Howell, a most competent person to lead out his division of the volunteers, the hostile copper colored denizens of the interior will find that all challenges will be accepted as heartily as they are given. The movement has, at no time, been a military one, and the approval of General Terry will have a good effect upon any who have had their doubts upon that subject.

EXPLANATORY.—It will be seen by reference to the Mason county case, that we have under the nomination "for Inspector (See page 1) Weights and Measures," after advising with ourselves and members of the Convention. It was done by consulting the Executive Committee, and the measure, approved January 24, 1865, which reads as follows: "See 6. That on the first regular meeting of the Board of County Commissioners in each county, the Executive Committee shall be styled 'Inspector of Weights and Measures,' and give bond to the county for the faithful performance of the duties of his office, as said County Commissioners direct."

PERSONAL ITEMS.—Gov. Green Clay Smith, accompanied by Col. Cummings, left for the Yellowstone on Saturday on business connected with the Volunteers. Col. Sanders, accompanied by Dr. James Gilchrist, left for the same place on the same day. The appointments of the Executive Committee, as published in to-day's paper, will be adhered to. These are a modification of the appointments as published in the Herald. Col. Sanders declining to speak on the Sabbath day. General Howell has arrived at the camp on the Yellowstone. Mrs. General Howell arrived yesterday per private conveyance for Benton, thence by river for the East. It was with sincere regret our citizens bid good bye to this most estimable lady, and her memory will ever be remembered by her friends in Montana. Quite a number of the citizens turned out in Nevada and formed an escort of honor to the officers and their flags of Erin and Columbia floated out on the breeze. Col. McClure leaves to-morrow to fulfill his appointments.

MONTANA LITHOGRAPHS.—It will be quite gratifying to all art lovers in our Territory to learn that Mr. E. Matthews has just published the fine pictures of Colorado now found in nearly every library in that Territory, and who has secured from the Colorado press the highest specimens for his lithographic plates. He has arranged in Virginia and is now preparing to make up a sketch book of Montana's unequalled scenery. These sketches are being engraved by the best artists in chromo-lithography, and bound handsomely, about thirty views to a volume, and furnished for the moderate sum of \$15. Mr. M. has recommendations from General Sherman and other distinguished personages, the former granting him the protection of the military, if necessary, in the prosecution of his labors. He proposes to make a tour or seven weeks stay in the Territory, and will be in the city in a day or two. It should be the aim of all who admire fine pictures to secure a copy of this work.

NOMINATIONS IN MISSOULA.—We are gratified to learn that our old and true friend, Judge J. M. Penney, of Missoula, has been nominated on the Union Ticket for Probate Judge of Missoula county. The Judge has long been identified with the growth and industry of the country, and possessing a fine legal knowledge and ability—the people of his county could not do themselves more credit than by electing him—which they will do, we have no doubt. He is a young and promising man, who served with honor and distinction throughout the war, has also been in nomination by the Union party, for Representative from the district from the Virginia and Montana counties, and has been elected to the office of Probate Judge of Missoula and Beaverhead. The most cheering news reach us from this remote county, giving assurance that political light is dawning upon it, as well as other counties, which will be strongly evidenced by the utter repudiation of the so-called Democracy will receive at the ensuing election.

MUSTERED OUT AND IN.—Capt. Jno. A. Nelson's company of the Montana Volunteers arrived in this city yesterday. The company was organized by Colonel Lewis (had advised) having expired. They were mustered out and complete papers were turned over to the Quartermaster and Ordnance Departments. Immediately after after 47 of the 50 members re-enlisted "for six months or during the campaign against the Indians, in accordance with the order of the Governor Smith. The company will at once return to the field. They are a splendid body of men and under excellent discipline. The time of their company is about expiring, a large number of whom will re-enlist. The delay in prosecuting active operations was caused by a lack of efficient arms, and later by the expiration of terms of service. All these difficulties will be surmounted in a few days.

ASSAY OFFICE.—A want long felt in this part of the Territory, is now supplied by the opening of Professor A. K. Eaton in furnishing, fitting and complete apparatus for assaying bullion or ores. The stamp of Professor A. K. Eaton will now be used as standard by the miner, merchant, mechanic, and banker. We therefore ask you to call at the rooms of the Professor, on Idaho street, in Virginia city, and judge for yourselves of the completeness and accuracy of the entire apparatus for a successful assay of bullion, dust or ore.

THE RESOLUTIONS.—We publish the resolutions adopted at the citizens' Postal meeting. It strikes at the root of the evil, and if carried into action and persisted in, the Territory will have the odious section of the postal law repealed, and contractors will be held strictly accountable for the performance of their duty. The fault lies not in this Territory, but the contractors, and the people of this place have started in the right manner to secure a redress of grievances. The matter will soon be thoroughly settled, and the right laid at the doors where it belongs. The accompanying petition is being universally signed. What say our neighboring cities and Territories?

ALL RIGHT IF THEY VOTE RIGHT.—The Democratic party of Montana is now in a position to think their Gallatin brethren very good on election day, but do not pay them the respect of consulting them as to their choice of nominees. Mr. John Ritchie is up for District Attorney in the official district; but why was Gallatin county left out in the cold in making the nomination? Good policy, perhaps; certainly very discourteous, however.

ABOUT SOLDIERS' PAY.—The time of many of the volunteers expiring, they are being mustered out. Nearly all are re-enlisting. On being mustered out, however, they are entitled to pay in full for their services, and to receive their money. Neither of these we have, but if ever there is a dollar paid for this organization, or its expenses, the soldiers who are serving under the same regulations as the regular army, will be able to receive it. The authority of General Terry to Governor Smith is full authority for their enlistment. The officers, on mustering out soldiers, give them receipts for the duplicate of their pay vouchers. These are vouchers for the pay due the soldiers, and as they are out of money they will have to disburse them. That there will be a discount upon them is not a matter of course, as capital is worth interest, and they cannot be redeemed until an approval is given by Congress. Soldiers' pay is a month's pay per pay at best, and purchase money is paid liberally with the boys who have been the wall of men, staying hostilities beyond our settlements. Give them all you can for their valor.
