Revenue Decision.

Commissioner Rollins has recently rendered the following decisions: The keeper of a hotel, inn or tavern, is liable to a special tax as such, if his annual gross receipts exceed \$1,000.

An alien who resides in the United States, and is, therefore, liable to tax upon his annual gains, profits and income, is entitled to the exemption of \$1,000 of that income in the same manner.

Every person who sells or offers for sale, any distilled spirits, fermented liquors, or wines of any kind, whose annual sale, including sales of merchandise, exceed \$25,000, is required to pay the special tax as a wholesale dealer in liquors.

A dealer may purchase and sell agricultural and farm products at the place of business designated in his special tax receipt, without thereby rendering himself liable as a produce broker.

7. The maintenance of the public faith, and credit, by the payment of the public debt, created for the perpetuation of American liberty.
