Synopsis of the New Tax Bill.

Washington, July 17.—Evening Session House.—The bill to pay Henry St. Marie ten thousand dollars for services in procuring the arrest of Surratt passed.

The Alaska appropriation bill passed omitting the section declaring the joint powers of the House with the President and Senate to contract treaties.

The appropriation bill was again considered.

Montpelier, Vt., July 17.—The Democratic convention nominated John L. Edwards for Governor and Mr. Noyes for Lieutenant Governor.

Philadelphia, July 17.—The supply of gas is exhausted and the strike still continues.

Washington, July 17.—Senator Howard today made a report from the joint committee of investigation of frauds in the ordinance department.

San Francisco, July 18.—The United States steamer Pensacola arrived at Victoria July 15th, and will probably proceed immediately to the wreck of the Suanee.

There was a mistake yesterday in Idaho advices of July 9th. The reported defeat of Gen. Crook is untrue.

London, July 17.—In the House of Commons last night Lord Stanley made an important statement.

Washington, July 17.—The Senate funding bill was reported from the ways and means committee and referred to committee of the whole.

The credentials from the Alabama representatives was referred to the committee on elections.

The House went into committee of the whole on the funding bill.

Mr. Stevens, "according to law."

Stevens. "What was that law? that interest should be paid up to a certain time at 6 per cent. in coin after the bonds fell due, they would be payable in money just as the gentleman of Illinois understood it; just as Mr. Stevens understood it; just as all understood it when the law was enacted; just as was explained on the floor a dozen times by the chairman of the committee of ways and means. If he knew any party in the country that would go for paying in coin that which was payable in money, thus enhancing the debt one half, if he knew there was such a platform and such a determination on the part of his own party, he would, with Frank Blair and all, vote for the other party. He would vote for no such swindle on the tax payers of the country."

The discussion continued at great length. The committee finally rose and took a recess till evening when the funding bill was again considered.

Washington, July 17.—Senate.—The credentials of Messrs. Abbott and Pool Senators of North Carolina were presented.

Summer from committee on foreign affairs reported the Alaska appropriation bill with a section declaring the right of redress should be taken out.

Cattell called up the bill providing for the issue of 3 per cent. certificates to the amount of twenty-five millions for the purpose of retiring the outstanding compound interest notes.

Wilson from military committee reported back the bill reducing the army to a peace establishment.

A new conference committee was appointed on the bill to supply temporary vacancies in the executive department.

The credentials of Kellogg, Harris and the senators of Louisiana were presented and both sworn in.

The Senate proceeded to consider the deficiency appropriation bill to which a number of amendments had been attached by the committee which were variously disposed of.

The committee of conference was ordered on the Indian appropriation bill.

Chandler stated the committee on commerce had decided not to press the passage of the river and harbor appropriation bill till next session.

Detroit, July 17.—Mrs. Gen. Hooker died at Watertown, New York, on Wednesday.

Chicago, July 18.—Senator Doollittle has written a letter opposing the 3d party movement, and favoring the election of Seymour and Blair.

Galveston, July 17.—A serious riot commenced on the evening of the 15th at Millican. It appears a mob of about 25 negroes led by a white school teacher and negro attorney named W. H. Miskley.

New York, July 18.—There are now 1,263 Mormons at Castle garden awaiting transportation to Utah.

Indianapolis, July 18.—A girl 8 years old committed suicide by hanging yesterday.

Newburyport, Mass. July 18.—Ada Wood, aged 17, committed suicide with arsenic in consequence of failing to receive an expected diploma at a school examination.

New York, July 18.—24 deaths from heat were reported at the coroner's office yesterday.

The Master Masons at a meeting last night resolved to continue firm against bricklayers on the strike.

Chicago, July 18.—The new tax bill though not so long as former bills of this kind is very intricate.

There are to be 25 supervisors of internal revenue appointed by the Secretary on recommendation of the commissioners.

On motion, a committee of three was appointed by the Chair, on permanent organization, consisting of Lew Remish, W. S. Scribner and R. McNeal.

The Chairman of the committee presented the following as permanent organization:

On motion, the report was adopted.

On motion, the Chair appointed a committee of three on order of business, consisting of Jas. L. Fisk, J. C. McFarland, and V. M. Clary.

On motion, the Convention took a recess for twenty-five minutes, while the committee were preparing a platform and resolutions.

The Chairman again called the Convention to order, when the Committee on Order of Business presented the following report:

MR. CHAIRMAN.—Your Committee on the Order of Business beg to recommend that the Convention first proceed to the consideration and adoption of Platform and Resolutions; next to the nomination of candidates for the following offices, viz: One County Commissioner; one County Assessor; one member of the Legislative Council; five members of the Assembly.

Respectfully submitted, JAS. L. FISK, E. E. WALKER, JNO. A. NELSON.

On motion, report was received and adopted.

The Committee on Platform and Resolutions presented the following:

PLATFORM. We do, with one accord, most heartily endorse the platform adopted by the Union Republican Convention at Chicago, and recognize in the nomination of Ulysses S. Grant for President, and Schuyler Colfax for Vice-President, the true principles of the great Union party and feel confident that they, as standard bearers, will lead the party to victory, and secure for the Nation harmony and prosperity.

RESOLUTIONS. WHEREAS, The official conduct of that portion of the Territorial Central Committee, known as the Executive Committee, to whom has been intrusted the whole control of the party, has been such as to create dissensions and distrust in our ranks, where unity, confidence and harmony are so important and essential to our success;

and therefore we, the representatives of the Union Republican party of Lewis and Clark county, in Convention assembled, do repudiate such conduct and are compelled from a sense of duty to the Union party to condemn in the most unqualified terms the conduct of the Chairman of the said Central Committee; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Union Republican County Central Committee of this county be, and they are hereby instructed to request the Territorial Central Committee to call and assemble a Territorial Convention at Helena, on the 9th day of September, 1868, for the purpose of re-organizing the Union Republican party, appointing a new Territorial Central Committee, and for the transaction of such other business as may legitimately come before it; and in case the Territorial Committee fail or refuse to comply with such request within a reasonable time, then said County Committee is hereby instructed to confer with the several County Committees of the Territory, with a view to the assembling of such Convention at Helena, at the time hereinbefore specified; and we do most cordially invite all good Union Republicans throughout the Territory, who have the interest and success of the party at heart, to co-operate with us in this important movement.

On motion, nominations were then declared in order.

The Convention then proceeded to nominate and ballot for the several different offices, with the following result: For County Commissioner—John Kinna.

For Assessor—John A. Nelson. For Member of Council—R. McNeil. For Members of the Legislative Assembly—Sol. Star, Frank Getchel, Chas. Rice, Cornelius Hedges, Charles Hendrie.

For Justice of the Peace—Matthew McGuirk. For Constable—Geo. F. Cowan. For Justice of the Peace (Nelson Precinct)—John Pool.

For Constable (Nelson Precinct)—John Bell.

On motion, the Chair appointed a Committee of six as the Republican County Central Committee for the ensuing year. The Committee consisted as follows: J. J. Williams, W. S. Scribner, Milo Courtwright, James Fergus, Geo. F. Cowan, and Felix Poznansky.

On motion, the Secretary was requested to furnish the Daily Helena Herald and the Daily Post with a copy of the proceedings of the Convention.

On motion, the Convention then adjourned—with three cheers and a tiger for the ticket and the Union.
