GOOD MEN READY

LINCOLN CLUB COMMITTEE FOR MCKINLEY'S RECEPTION.

WORK WITH THE NEW MAYOR

They Started the Agitation That Led to the President Being Invited to Anaconda, But Will Not Allow the Visit to Be Marred by a Mean Partisan Spirit.

The above constitutes the committee named last night by President M. B. Hendricks, of the Lincoln Republican club, to receive President McKinley and distinguished party when they arrive in Anaconda.

While the Lincoln club is the first organization to take any other steps towards the entertainment of the chief executive when he reaches this city, it must be understood that the club will not dictate what plans shall be made for the reception. On the contrary, it was the intention that the committee selected last night should first ascertain the wishes of the mayor and city council and the general committee which, no doubt, will be named immediately after Mayor-elect Stephens is inaugurated next Monday, and then to offer whatever assistance possible to make the president's visit to the city an enjoyable one.

All the Societies in Line.

Being the most active republican organization in the state, the Lincoln club as a body, will be accorded a prominent place in the reception. The mayor will invite other organizations to participate in the proceedings and there ought to be in line that day a great many civic societies.

The committee appointed last night will meet on Wednesday evening next for organization and get actively to work at once.

The special committee appointed at the previous meeting, which was authorized to look into the matter of providing improvements for the club rooms in the way of social games, etc., submitted a report stating that the desired implements of amusement could be procured

CYCLE PATHS ARE ADMIRABLE

Smooth Wheeling to the Various Beauty Spots Near Anaconda—Much Work Already Done.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, May 4.—The building of the cycle path to Gregson Springs is being pushed forward with all possible speed by the Anaconda Cycle Path association and its completion within the next ten days is an assured thing. Over three miles of the road has already been completed. Those who have been over it pronounce it first-class and declare that the smooth, clear sailing on the hard path, free from rocks and dust is a great temptation for the rider to do a little racing with himself.

The path to the new reduction works was completed Thursday and is very much appreciated by the wheelmen employed there, as well as the large number of daily visitors who ride out on their cycles.

In pursuance of an order made at the last meeting empowering the president to appoint three members from the association to act in conjunction with the president and secretary on an executive board of five, E. B. Catlin, L. V. Bennett and O. S. Jackson were yesterday chosen by president F. M. Brown. A legislative committee was also appointed consisting of G. B. Winston, E. B. Catlin and Rod Williams. The committee has had informal interviews with the county commissioners who have expressed their willingness to help the good roads cause along and the city officials will be asked to join in with the many drivers of fine horses each to do a share of the work.

There is no doubt that the energy and force back of the movement will work out some good results, and many cycle paths will be built and many rocks removed from the roads surrounding the city. The association has now a membership of 120, and has collected \$102, with an expenditure of \$75 to date.

SEINING FISH THROUGH ICE

Pot Hunters Robbing the Lakes of Their Speckled Beauties by Illegal Fishing Methods.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, May 4.—The fact of the Anaconda fish market being over stocked with fine trout, peddled from house to house and hold to the restaurants and hotels by fish mongers has awakened the suspicions of men here interested in the game law pertaining to the protection of the finny tribe.

An investigation made within the past few days discovered a band of law breakers at Breen's Lake, at Georgetown, 18 miles west of here, who are seining trout through the ice by cutting holes and stringing their seine along as successfully as it can be done from boats after the ice goes out. In one instance a seine was found stretched out for a distance of 300 feet.

State Game Warden Scott was written yesterday concerning the matter, and it is not unlikely that some brave fisherman will be brought up on the carpet to account for the unsportsmanlike method of catching trout, and after a good fine or jail sentence is imposed it is believed by the nimrods here interested in the affair, that the practice will stop.

GO INTO OFFICE ON MONDAY

New City Administration Will Assume the Reins of Government on May 6th.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, May 4.—The new city administration will go into power at the city hall next Monday at noon, at which hour mayor-elect Stephens will be inducted into office.

The retiring city council will meet at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to clean up a lot of unfinished business and listen to the final report of Mayor Madden.

Verbal Contract Failed.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, May 4.—John H. Wein was made defendant today in a law suit in which Jacob Holzberg seeks to recover from him \$4,100.55 for alleged breach of contract. The plaintiff says that he went into partnership with the defendant in the establishment and conduct of a copper precipitating plant in Butte, they having only a verbal contract. From the complaint, it seems that Holzberg was to pay his part of the contract in wages as manager of the property at the rate of \$4 per day, and Wein in return was to convey a half interest to him. This, it is alleged, he did not do, but on April 15 sold the property and converted the proceeds to his own use.

Elks' Seats Go Like Hot Cakes.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, May 4.—The advance sale of seats for the Elks' minstrel show begun this morning at 9 o'clock at the Smith Drug store. The minstrels are going to be a howling success and the audience that will assemble at the theater next Tuesday will be probably the largest that ever assembled there. Thompson of the Montana Meat company, who occupies Mr. Acklin's house at 608 Locust street, was notified to vacate the premises. Mr. Thompson became suspicious and held his landlord up for a reason for such proceedings, and to him was revealed the secret. The "boys" employed at the desk with Mr. Acklin were soon after advised, and congratulations were in order.

Only \$40 was found upon him when he was taken into custody.
