THE NEW CITY COUNCIL NOT IN HARMONY AT INITIAL MEETING

Mayor Stephens Presents Only One Name for Confirmation—Appointee Turned Down and Council Adjourns to Settle Its Differences Outside.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)
Anaconda, May 7.—Things did not run so very smoothly at the city hall last night. The mayor and city council failed to dwell in harmony and as a result the new city administration made an unfortunate beginning. The start was particularly unhappy for the reason that the mayor is a republican and nine out of the twelve aldermen are republicans, still they could not agree, and when the mayor undertook to announce his appointments the hostilities developed into an open rupture. The mayor presented only one name, that of C. M. Sawyer for city attorney and he was turned down by a vote of 7 to 5.

Trouble Brewing for Weeks.
Upon the announcement of the vote the mayor stated that he would make no more appointments for the present, and refused to proceed further with them. Alderman McHugh wanted him to proceed anyway, and put a motion before the house to that effect, but he was ruled out of order by the mayor, who declared it was not use, if the council would not confirm his nominations. In the meantime Anaconda's democratic appointed officials who served under ex-Mayor Madden are holding onto their jobs and drawing their salaries as heretofore.

The trouble which made itself manifest last night has been brewing for several weeks. The aldermen insist that they have been ignored almost entirely by the mayor ever since election; that he showed no disposition to consult with them and talk over matters in general, until one day his attention was called to it.

A meeting was then arranged for, also a second one, but neither resulted in any good, and the breach widened instead of lessened. The aldermen took it that the mayor, as some of them expressed it, "wanted to be the whole thing," and they decided to block the game until

RUSH THE DEPOT RENOVATION

Old Montana Union Station House Will Be a Beauty When Repairs Are Finished.

Anaconda, May 7.—The work preparatory to the occupancy of the old Montana Union depot at the foot of Main street by the Butte, Anaconda and Pacific railway company is being pushed forward as rapidly as possible and the depot and tracks will be in readiness for the change to be made by the first of June. The change will be a most convenient one for the traveling public as well as for the railway company in making room for the general offices in the building now used as a depot.
A large gang of men are tearing up the tracks that have been out of use so long by the old depot and new rails and new ties are being laid. The work of filling the low, rough ground on the south side of the building has been completed and covered with cinders. A gang of car-

penters and painters will be put to work renovating the building within a few days and the improvements mapped out will make the now rusty looking old building a bright and attractive structure that will greatly ornament and improve the foot of Main, the principal street.
