NOT ONE IS LEGAL


LIVINGSTON OFFICIALS ARE IN TROUBLE OVER THE LAW.

FAILED TO FILE THEIR BONDS

Old City Council Declared Vacant, and New Men Did Not Comply With the Statutes—Apparently No Authorized Officers to Sustain the Dignity and Enforce the Ordinances.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)
Livingston, May 10.—An anomalous condition of affairs has been discovered to exist in the status of the municipal government of Livingston. Nobody knows who is mayor, who are aldermen, who is police judge, or any other official in the town.

Section 473 of the political code provides that officers shall file their oaths of office and official bond within ten days after they have been notified of their election. By some oversight or other, not one of the newly elected officers complied with this provision.

say who shall fill the offices made vacant by the failure of the newly elected officers to qualify? Is P. W. Nelson, whose picture is here given, chief of police? Is Louis Hansen right watch or not? Can a mayor make valid appointments when he himself has not complied with the law making him a de jure official? If he is merely a de facto executive, would his appointments hold good as against a kick by any taxpayer? Is he even mayor de facto, or does he hold his office without right? If he does, upon whom would the duty devolve to bring quo warranto proceedings and have him ousted? And in case he is ousted, would the old council have the authority to proceed and elect a mayor and members of the council? These are a few questions the people of Livingston would like to have somebody answer for them.

In event the old council holds over, the republicans would have a majority of one, and consequently would be able, should they so desire, to elect the officers who failed to comply with the law. Robinson, of the Third, would have no vote, for the reason that he has removed from the ward and would be disqualified. Still, there might be some question as to this, for the reason that the office has never been declared vacant, but Robinson has been suffered through the courtesy of the council to retain his seat. However, Mayor Smith at the last meeting, sustained an objection to Robinson's right to vote on the electric light bill, which action might be construed as a declaration that a vacancy exists.

At any rate, things are badly muddled up, and a solution seems difficult to obtain.
Sensational Divorce.

Livingston, May 10.—Three divorces were granted in the district court this week. One of them was the case of Anna H. Bauman vs. Herman Bauman, a prominent citizen of Livingston, and a man who is fairly well-to-do. The grounds upon which the divorce was granted was cruelty. Bauman accused his wife of poisoning her father, John Bartach, who died some three weeks ago. He insisted upon a post mortem.

Put an end to Gambling.

Livingston, May 10.—County Attorney Miller has decreed that gambling shall be stopped in Livingston. Last night he caused to be mailed to every saloon keeper in Livingston a manifesto to the effect of patricide. Mrs. Bauman was awarded \$4,000 alimony, which must be paid before the first day of June, under an order of the court.

Shot Himself in the Leg.

Livingston, May 10.—Adam Pfiffer was shot in the leg Wednesday night by the accidental discharge of a revolver, which he carried in his pocket. The weapon dropped out of the pocket onto the floor, striking on the hammer and being discharged. The wound is merely a flesh wound and is not at all dangerous.

No Trace of Trail Creek Man.

Livingston, May 10.—No trace has been discovered of George Reider, the Trail Creek sawmill man, who disappeared five weeks ago. Sheriff Beier and Under-sheriff McDonald made a trip to Trail Creek Thursday, but the snow was so deep that nothing could be done toward unraveling the mystery surrounding the disappearance of the missing man.

WATER SHUT OFF

HEAVY RAIN FILLED BOZEMAN RESERVOIR WITH SAND.

CITY WENT DRY FOR ONE DAY

Housekeepers in Tribulation Over the Closing Down of the Mains—Part of the Mountain Slid Down and Covered the Supply Pipe With Unwelcome Debris—Nothing Political.

Bozeman, May 10.—The recent heavy rain storm brought down a large amount of gravel from the hills immediately above the source of the city water supply, filling up the dam so that no water could be turned into the reservoir. Thursday morning a great many of the patrons of this city's industry made the startling and disagreeable discovery that when the tap was turned on, there was no response in the way of water. By many it was attributed to the new city government, claiming that the water works had bucked against the change of administration. This suspicion, however, is far from right, as the changes made were so few that the most partisan accumulation of aqua pura could not be justified in going on a strike, to the great discomfiture of cleanly housewives.

A HOBO EPIDEMIC AT LOGAN

Bozeman, May 10.—The people residing in and near Logan have stood the hobo element as long as they could, and to gain relief from this nuisance have prevailed upon the county commissioners to allow the sheriff to station a deputy at that point, whose duty it will be to look after this undesirable class of tourists and keep them within the bounds of decency and order.

Robbery of men who travel in freight cars to save the cost of transportation is frequent, as this point offers superior advantages for leaving the main line to Butte or Helena. Last year a fellow-traveler in this class, who happened to have a few dollars about his person, was held up and robbed within sight of the town, and to make his escape, attempted to cross the Gallatin river. In doing so he got beyond his depth and was drowned.

The citizens have been terrorized as long as no officer was about to look after this class, and deeming themselves entitled to as much protection as the residents of any other portion of the county, have petitioned the commissioners to allow them an officer.


