 Mayor Stephens announced the appointments soon after that body convened and each one was confirmed with little or no opposition in the order in which they were named.
 The only opposition displayed to city Attorney Sawyer and Clerk Wisner, was Alderman O'Leary who voted "no" in each instance.

Taylor Had a Sure Thing.
 Chief of Police Taylor pulled through in a vote of 9 to 3. O'Leary, Gangner and Stuernagle being against his confirmation. Alderman Gangner undertook to explain his objections, but the mayor declared him out of order and he was forced to yield the floor until his vote was called, when he declared the principal reason for his opposition was because he thought the nominee was not qualified on account of inexperience in the police line.
 E. H. MacDonald, for city engineer, met with no opposition and was unanimously confirmed, also Dr. Evans for health officer.
 Two aldermen—Gangner and O'Leary—were against George Broder for street commissioner.

There were some objections raised to the nominations for patrolmen, Aldermen Collins and McHugh voting against John Barkovich; Wallace, Gangner and Stuernagle were against Barney Fitzpatrick;

McHugh voted "no" to the name of Charles Smole; Collins, McHugh and O'Leary did the same when the name of John Marchion was called, but F. B. Gordon and Peter Kinnon received the entire vote of the council.
 A recess was taken in order to allow the new officials time to file their bonds and take the oath of office. Attorney Sawyer's bondsmen are John H. French and Arthur Fortier, who stand good for the amount of \$2,000. The sureties of City Clerk Wisner, in the same amount, are T. C. Davidson and C. W. French.
 With the exception of two—Assistant Chief O'Brien and Officer Powers—the change in the police department is complete.
 Chief Taylor took charge of the police department at once and the new patrolmen were sent out on their beats last night.
 The fire department will remain unchanged.
 The appointments made by the mayor last night seem to give general satisfaction. All of them are good, capable men, and will be a credit to Mayor Stephens' administration.

NEW HEAD OF POLICE FORCE

William Taylor, Chosen by the City Council to Superintend the Peace of Anaconda.

 Anaconda, May 14.—William Taylor, the new chief of the Anaconda police department, was born in Lake county, Illinois, 36 years ago. He has been a



resident of Montana for eleven years, during which time he has resided in Butte and Anaconda. For nearly eight years he has held a position as foreman of the lower smelter works of the Anaconda Copper Mining company at Carroll. He has a family of a wife and one child and resides at 1103 East Fifth street.

CROP PROSPECTS ARE FINE

Deer Lodge County Will Reap a Bountiful Harvest This Fall, if All Goes Well.

 Anaconda, May 14.—County Assessor George S. Miller returned last night from a trip into the rural districts, where he has been busily engaged in placing a valuation on taxable property. He is visiting every farm house in the county and reports progress with his work. It will take, he says, about ten days longer to complete the job and then he will have nothing left but the making up of the assessment rolls, which, later, are to be turned over to the county treasurer.

In speaking of the crop prospects, Mr. Miller says they were never better in Deer Lodge county. The recent rains have done an immense amount of good and as a consequence the farmers are quite jubilant.
 "The fields of small grain look rich," said Mr. Miller this morning, "and the wheat is out of the ground fully six or eight inches."
 "The small fruit, too, looks splendid, and there is every indication that this year is going to be a very prosperous one for the country folks."
 "The grass is growing nicely and stock never looked better at this time of the year."

PREPARE FOR THE RECEPTION

The reception committee is also expected to meet in the council chamber at the same hour.

At a conference between members of the decoration and executive committees held yesterday afternoon, the matter of building an arch constructed entirely of copper was favorably discussed, and in all probability the plan will be carried out of the presidential party comes to Anaconda.

THE GOOD ROADS MOVEMENT

Ranchers Pleased to See the Cyclists Start the Good Work—Donating Money and Labor.

 Anaconda, May 14.—The Anaconda Cycle Path and Good Roads association has succeeded in interesting the city authorities and county commissioners in the improvement of the county roads and city drives, and if the work now well started can be continued for a few weeks the bad spots in the roads leading out of the city can be fixed up and put in fine condition.

The work of clearing off the logs on the road east of the city near the Butte, Anaconda & Pacific tracks was started yesterday, and will be completed in a few days. This is the worst piece of road between the city and Gregson.

Work on the cycle path is progressing rapidly, and although the roughest part of the road is yet to be gone over, the encouragement and support offered by the many cyclists assures its completion.

The ranchers along the route are pleased to see the path built, and are encouraging and assisting the association in every way. John Reece has offered the use of his team for filling some rough places and hauling timbers for bridges, donated by Morgan Evans, who has also done considerable work on the path.

TROUBLES OF THE MACHINISTS

Charles Boyd, Charged With Disturbance, Makes Himself Scarce—The O'Donnell Assault.

 Anaconda, May 14.—Charles Boyd, the machinist for whom a warrant of arrest was issued yesterday on the charge of disturbing the peace, has not yet been apprehended. The information that the officers were looking for him undoubtedly reached his ears, and he has since been successful in keeping under cover.

Boyd made a demonstration yesterday when John Kiley was leaving the court room of Judge Kennedy after the arraignment of James L. O'Donnell, who is charged with making an assault upon Kiley, who, the striking machinists say, is a "scab."

Kiley was twice spirited away out of town since the foundry strike. Once he was taken to a point about five miles west of Anaconda and in the middle of the night allowed his freedom. The night was cold and he was thinly clad, but he found shelter and later came back to town and went to work again. He turned up at Lima, claiming he had been drugged and did not know where he was until he recovered his faculties on an O. S. L. train at that point. Last Saturday he was thrashed.


