RECORD BREAKER

CUSTER COUNTY LAMB AND WOOL CROP IS PHENOMENAL.

THE STOCKMEN ARE JUBILANT

Cattle Also Doing Well, But Good Rains Are Needed to Make Late Pasture—This Promises to Be the Banner Year in the History of Eastern Montana.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)
Miles City, May 17.—The lambing and shearing season in eastern Montana has advanced sufficiently to show a very remarkable increase in bands of sheep, and the wool-clipping is also a record-breaker. There is not only an increase in the yield of wool per head, but the wool staple or fiber is both longer and stronger than usual. This adds greatly to its commercial and actual value.
The present outlook for stock growers is encouraging. The "calf crop" is excellent and range grass is good, but there is great need of rain to sustain the growth of range pasture. June rains may supply the present lack of moisture.

Miles City Will Celebrate.

Miles City, May 17.—Miles City is organizing for an old-time Fourth of July celebration. A novel feature projected by the committee of arrangements is to have a band of 75 Cheyenne Indians there. For a Permanent Horse Auction.

Miles City, May 17.—The Montana Range Horse company, of this city, is scheduled to make an experiment in the line of horse sales by organizing a three days' auction sale, beginning May 20. The promoters are certain of the presence of a large number of buyers. The managers are assured that there will be no lack of horses offered, and good ones, too.

If the enterprise proves to be a success, an effort will be made to establish public auction sales of horses as a permanent institution at Miles City.

ANACONDA NEWS

INTERESTING CASE IN COURT

Petelin Seeks to Recover From Justice Kennedy the Money He Lost in Paying Costs.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)
Anaconda, May 17.—The case of Joseph Petelin against Justice Frank Kennedy was called up for trial in the district court this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Petelin is an Austrian by birth and has only been a resident of this country a few years. Last December he managed to get into trouble by making an assault upon a fellow workman employed in the smelters. He was arrested, and as a consequence of his behavior was fined \$100 by Justice Kennedy, before whom he was given a hearing. He was unable to pay the amount and was committed to the county jail, where he served 50 days. On December 28 a garnishment was issued against wages due him from the Anaconda Copper Mining company and \$44.75 belonging to him was paid into Justice Kennedy's court.
When Petelin got out of jail he wanted his money, but it wasn't paid him, so through his attorney, C. M. Sawyer, a

suit was brought by Petelin to recover in Justice Quane's court from the justice who had sent him to jail.
The case was heard and Justice Quane decided against the defendant, whereupon an appeal was taken to the district court.
Petelin's attorney contends that Justice Kennedy had no right to collect this money and retain it, inasmuch as his client had served out his sentence in the county jail.
Justice Kennedy, on the other hand, insisted that he could not return the money, but it would have to be done, if at all, through an act of the county commissioners; that he customarily made his reports to the members of that body of all monies collected under such circumstances in his tribunal.
The case caused considerable interest and the court room contained the usual number of visitors.

THE STATE GUN CLUB SHOOT

LARGE GRIST OF POLICE NEWS

Many Offenders of Various Kinds Called Up to Receive Punishment for Their Misdeeds.

Anaconda, May 17.—William Peck, who was sentenced in Justice Quane's court yesterday to 20 days' imprisonment in the county jail, on the charge of vagrancy, is believed to be the man who broke open two trunks at the residence of Attorney J. W. James, on Cherry street, Tuesday night, and carried off two suits of clothes belonging to Mr. James, and as soon as his present sentence expires he will be re-arrested and tried on the charge of burglary. The trunks were stored in the woodshed for a few days only, to make room for house cleaning while Peck was employed at the shed sawing wood. It is believed that he thus became acquainted with the premises and the location of the trunks. The clothing was recovered by Night Chief O'Brien last night and is now at the city hall.

COUNCIL BILL NO. 22.
A bill for an ordinance extending Idaho street, in the City of Butte, and to condemn private property for opening the same.

ORDINANCE NO. 612.
An ordinance extending Idaho street, in the City of Butte, and to condemn private property for opening the same. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Butte:

Section 1. That Idaho street be, and the same is hereby, ordered laid out and established and extended, in the City of Butte.

Sec. 2. The property sought to be condemned and appropriated for the purpose of extending Idaho street is bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the west line of Idaho street and the south line of the Travana Fraction Lode claim; thence N. 1 degree 11 minutes W., along the west line of Idaho street as produced northerly from the Travana Add., 172 feet, more or less, to the south line of the Original Butte Townsite; thence southerly, along the east line of the Travana Fraction Lode claim, 138 feet, more or less, to the north line of the Travana Add.; thence S. 52 degrees 15 minutes W., along the said north line of the Travana Add., 25 feet to the place of beginning.

Also, that certain portion of the Manhattan lode claim bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of the Travana Add., and the east line of the Travana Fraction lode claim; thence N. 3 degrees 20 minutes W., 158 feet, more or less, to the south line of the Original Butte Townsite; thence easterly, along the said Townsite line, 80 feet, more or less, to the east line of Idaho street as produced northerly from the Travana Add.; thence southerly, along the said east line of Idaho street, 113 feet, more or less, to the north line of the Travana Add.; thence S. 52 degrees 15 minutes W., 74.5 feet to the place of beginning.

All of the above described property being situated in the City of Butte, County of Silver Bow, and State of Montana.

Sec. 3. The estate or right in the said lands which shall vest in the said City of Butte, by virtue of this ordinance, shall be an easement, and the said lands shall be held and maintained by the said city as a public street.

Sec. 4. Seventy-five per cent, of the cost

of condemning and obtaining the property mentioned in section 2 of this ordinance shall be assessed as a special tax against the property to be benefited by opening and extending said street, the tax to be proportioned to the benefits received from opening and extending the said street; the remaining twenty-five per cent, to be paid from the general fund of the city of Butte.
