ROBBERS HOLD UP A SALOON
ONE CAPTURED AND ONE ESCAPED

As a result of a daring attempt to hold up Gorman Bros. saloon on South Arizona street yesterday morning, James Smith, alias Adams, about 22 years of age, is locked up in the steel cage at the city jail. The young man's companion in crime, although fired at several times by the police, jumped through a large window at the rear of the saloon and made his escape. The fleeing robber dropped the money he had secured from the cash register, on the floor of the saloon.

James Gorman, one of the proprietors of the saloon, who was on duty at the time the robbers entered the place, is now nursing a severe scalp wound, received at the hands of the desperate man who escaped, and who apparently was the leader of the pair.

But for the fortunate appearance of Policeman McDonald on East Park street at the time of the hold-up, it is probable both robbers would have escaped, taking with them the money they secured from the cash register.

Mr. Gorman had been attended to in good shape, and at the time of the appearance of the policeman was lying unconscious on the floor. No one was in the saloon at the time excepting the proprietor and the hold-ups. Mr. Gorman was surprised by the robbers and struck on the head with a gun before he could give an alarm.

Policeman McDonald was patrolling his beat on East Park street about 3 o'clock this morning when he noticed two suspicious looking men going toward the rear of the Gorman saloon. He followed them a short distance, and when they reached the "Try Me" saloon they stopped and sized up the place.

"DOE" WAS A WISE FINLANDER

He Claimed Not to Understand English But Judge Clancy Called His Bluff.

The usual grind of drunks, disturbers and scrappers appeared before Judge Boyle in the police court this morning, and the monotony of the day was broken only by the presence of one "John Doe," a Finlander. A charge of fighting at the Castle saloon was made against the man, together with one of resisting an officer. To both he said, like the foxey Chinaman, "Me no sabby." The condition of the "Fin's" face was certainly sufficient evidence to convict him on the former charge, and Policeman McGillie's coat bore the marks of a lively tilt with someone. The court set Doe's case for next Tuesday at 3 o'clock. Judge Boyle said he would have an interpreter on hand.

Tom Murphy, Tom Sexton and John Duffy were each separated from \$5, while the case of Mrs. Johnson and Thomas Horn, charged with having disturbed the peace, was placed on the docket for Tuesday afternoon.

The motion to modify the restraining order in the case of the Black Placer company against E. F. Dunkel, was being presented to the court, by W. I. Lippincott, who appeared for the defendant. Mr. Lippincott began to explain the case and for five consecutive minutes he held the court spellbound by his eloquence. Suddenly the spell was fractured.

"Well, here, I have heard enough of this," said the judge. "This case belongs on the other side, but you broke into this department with it. I don't want to hear any more of it."

"If you honor please—"

"Never mind now."

"But I would like to explain."

"Don't want to hear any explanations."

"Can I say—"

"Sit down or I'll send you to jail," roared the judge.

"This motion is dismissed."

"I'll take an exception," said the attorney.

"You can have it. Give it to him Mr. Clerk," said Judge Clancy.

Continuing down the alley, the robbers stopped at the Gorman and covered the lower portion of their faces with handkerchiefs. He noticed them go into the back door and followed.

As McDonald reached the door, the man who afterwards escaped was securing the money from the cash register. Gorman was lying on the floor, where he had fallen when struck. McDonald ordered the men to throw up their hands. They made a run for it, and he fired, he says, in order to frighten them if possible. One of the robbers played "quits," but the other dashed for the rear window of the saloon, and without waiting to raise it jumped through the glass, taking the cash with him.

Handcuffs were put on the captured robber, and he was taken to jail.

Policemen McNally and Old tracked the escaped robber several blocks, where the trail was lost, but an effort will be made today to locate the desperado.

Mr. Gorman said he was emptying a bucket of water about 3 o'clock this morning when he heard a noise, and, turning quickly, was struck on the head by one of the men who had entered the rear door.

"I think he used a gun to hit me," said Mr. Gorman. "All I know of the men is that they were both young and about the same size, tall and slender. The man who escaped had the gun and seemed to do most of the work."

The captured man, when searched at the station, was unarmed.

There was about \$100 in the cash register of the saloon when the robbers entered, and the money was afterwards picked up where the escaping robber dropped it.


