A HARD DAY ON THE DOGS

Stray Pups Fell Under the Ban of the Poundmaster—Tags Were a Demand.

He was busy for an hour wiring stray dogs without proper tags; by that time the cage was filled with a motley collection of dogs of all breeds, colors and sizes.
A number of irate citizens called at the city treasurer's office in the city hall during the morning and purchased the tags necessary to redeem their canine property from the poundmaster's hands. The language they used regarding the poundmaster, the "dog catcher" and the ordinance under which predatory operations are conducted was more forcible than elegant.

COUNTY OFFICERS OBJECT.

The county attorney, sheriff and county commissioners are considerably worried over the fact that in the division of the business of the district court the criminal and insanity part has been thrown into Department No. 3, which is located about three blocks from the county jail. FATHER OF SOCIETY IS COMING

Francis E. Clark of Boston Will Attend Meetings Which Begin Tomorrow Evening in the First Presbyterian Church—Delegates to Be Entertained by Butte Churches—The Program.

HE FILLS A PAUPER'S GRAVE,

Identity of a Man Buried in Potter's Field Disclosed by a Letter of Inquiry.

The letter received by Mayor Davey from Sadie McAfee of Pittsburg, Penn., and published in Monday's Inter Mountain, inquiring as to the whereabouts of Peter McAfee, brought the information to the police that McAfee died here about a year ago.

It was learned that McAfee was buried at the poor farm. Miss Coffey, the writer of the letter of inquiry stated that she is the niece of McAfee and that she had not heard from her uncle for about a year. She stated that a previous letter to Mayor McCarthy had given her the information that McAfee had gone to the Klondike.
McAfee was known in Butte as "Double-Up Pete." He was not known to work in Butte but was well liked by those who were acquainted with him. He had a good education and was considered honest.

"Pete" went to the Klondike from Butte, but after staying there a short time returned to Montana. He had been here but a few weeks when he was taken ill with pneumonia and died a few days later. McAfee told many of his friends here that he was of a good family and that his brother had been Mayor of Pittsburg for a number of years.

IN THE HOTEL LOBBIES.

"I see," said Con Bray, "that William Sturgis, that sturdy pioneer, has passed over the Great Divide. We crossed the plains together in '62, and I tell you that seems like a long while ago to me. Many of us, who at that time were in the prime of life, have made the last journey to that unknown land beyond the grave."

"Along with others, Sturgis and I went from Bannack into what is now known as Bray's canyon and helped build the mill known as the Pioneer saw mill. We had the mill completed and were sawing lumber by May 1, 1863.

"Alder Gulch was discovered during the following month and the first lumber used there came from our mill. It was sold to William Fairweather and Barney Hughes and was used to construct the 'rockers' with which old Alder Gulch was first prospected. Later on with six teams I hauled from the mill the first load of lumber ever used in Virginia City.

Four of my partners in the enterprise, including Sturgis, are dead; the other two are living in St. Paul. "How we came to build the mill illustrates the ability of the pioneers to utilize the means of hand. It was noticed by Godfrey, one of the party, in coming across the plains that our wagons had iron axle-trees, and he suggested that they would make a good crank for a sawmill shaft. Acting on that suggestion, we organized a company to build a sawmill."

The machinists of the country are not the "only pebbles" when it comes to striking. The two attractive young ladies who presided at the Thornton hotel dinner stand demanded an increase in their wages of 3 a week and finding their employer flinty-hearted quit work on the spot and walked out. They had been receiving \$15 a week, but thought that amount incommensurate with the value of their services.

The Thornton is now without a cigar and news stand, as the owners took their wares out of the show cases and carted them away. The cigar and news stand was conducted by Heilbronner and Silverman, who also have charge of the bowling alleys in the basement, and the management of the hotel has nothing to do with either department.

PERSONAL MENTION.

Dan McDonald, president of the Western labor union, departed this afternoon to attend the national convention at Denver. He is accompanied by his wife. The other delegates will not leave for Denver until Thursday.

George L. Ramsey of the Union Bank and Trust company of Helena was in this city yesterday in connection with the school bond issue of \$100,000. The bid of his bank was accepted by the trustees. Mr. Ramsey is a sterling republican and an all-around good fellow. His numerous friends in Butte were glad to hear of his success in the bond matter.

Ex-Police Judge J. C. Sullivan and W. F. Scheffel, who officiated as police court clerk during the incumbency of Mayor McCarthy, have formed a co-partnership and engaged in the real estate business, with rooms in the Mantle block. During their official tenure the two grew to admire each other so much that they concluded to continue their association in private life.
