MOVE TO THEIR NEW QUARTERS

New Passenger Station Is Now Open for Use—Good News for the Traveling Public.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, May 31.—The old depot, which was recently remodeled and made into a first-class passenger station, was formally opened this afternoon, and is once more in active service.

The last train to depart from what is now known as the Butte, Anaconda & Pacific general office building was the 11 o'clock passenger, which left for Butte this forenoon.

Immediately after that train had departed, all hands were put to work and the ticket and baggage departments were moved over to the new station, and when Train No. 3 from Butte arrived at 1:15 o'clock the officials were duly installed in their future quarters.

It was not expected to open the station until tomorrow, but everything being ready the change was made today.

The change is greatly appreciated by the general public, and the present management of the road has done nothing to give the people of Anaconda more satisfaction than the change of the passenger station.

READY FOR HIS NEW OFFICE

Railroad Superintendent Spencer Arrives in Anaconda to Take Up His Work at Once.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, May 31.—Hugh Spencer who was recently appointed to the position of superintendent of the B. A. & P. railroad arrived in the city yesterday from Mankato, Minnesota, and will assume his new duties tomorrow. The room formerly occupied by chief dispatcher Hayes and adjoining the suite occupied by General Manager Dean, has been put in order as an office for him.

Since the present management has had control of the road, there has been no official hearing the title of superintendent. The entire supervision of the line being under the care of General Manager Dean. But during the past year the traffic of the road has so greatly increased that the creation of the office of superintendent became a necessity, in order to lighten the burdens of Mr. Dean who has been simply overwhelmed with work.

Mr. Spencer the new superintendent is thoroughly versed in the science of railroading, and is looked upon as one of the most capable men in western railroad circles. He will certainly be a valuable addition to the official staff of the road.
