RACE FOR \$1,000

RIVAL CONTRACTORS TRYING FOR A GOOD PRIZE.

RUSHING THE SMOKE STACKS

Shoemaker, the Challenger, Leads in the Industrial Battle for the Completion of Their Work—Boilermakers and Masons Reap a Harvest in Added Wages—Interested Crowds.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, June 3.—M. S. Shoemaker, an Anaconda boilermaker foreman, thought he could build a smelter stack faster than could Contractor John Gerriek of Butte. Gerriek proved a Mis-sourian, and now one of the most unique races on record is in progress at the new works east of the Copper City.

Contractor Gerriek has built a number of stacks for the Anaconda company, and has made good time on them, but Shoemaker thought he could do better. He said so, and Gerriek challenged the statement; that started the contest.

Gerriek was given the start at the converter building and Shoemaker the one at the roaster building. Work began Monday, and the clang of hammer on steel did not cease yesterday, although it was Sunday.

Both stacks are of steel, lined with bricks, and brickmasons and boilermakers are employed in their construction. Both sides are giving the men premiums over their regular pay. Gerriek has been in the habit of paying his men \$5 instead of the regulation \$4 per day, provided they stay with the work from start to finish. It is said that in this case he has promised his men all the profit he will make by building this particular stack.

The rivalry is intense, and both gangs are working as only men offered such inducements can work. The stacks are climbing skyward at a rapid rate, with Shoemaker's stack a trifle ahead of his competitor's at the present time. Crowds daily gather to watch the racing crews, and a large audience is assured at the finish.

SUNDAY SPORTS AT ANACONDA

Horse and Foot Races Pulled Off in the Presence of a Large Crowd of Enthusiasts.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, June 3.—The first crowd of the season congregated at the race track west of town yesterday to see the match race between Mike P., owned by "Jimmie" Johnson, and May B., owned by William Hottenhoff.

May B. was driven by "Deaf Bob" and Mike P. by William Cassidy, former driver of Jib.

Another race has been matched for next Sunday between the same horses for a purse of \$250.

The race which was best two out of three, was won by Mike P., in two successive heats, time 2:30 and 2:26 3-4 respectively.

A foot race was pulled off between W. T. Atchison, a local athlete and W. A. Ragsdale of British Columbia. The distance was 80 yards, Atchison winning handsily in eight seconds.

The races were witnessed by several hundred people. The street car line gave excellent service to the track, cars running every 20 minutes. The car line between the track and city has been much improved of late, new rails having been laid the greater part of the way.

WOLFF WAS VERY FORTUNATE

Got Off Lucky in His Trial—Sure Death Awaited Him in Madison County.

Dillon, June 2.—John Wolff, the murderer of Sheriff James Summers of Madison county, was taken to the penitentiary yesterday afternoon, where, if no fool governor interferes with the well deserved punishment meted out to him he will remain for the balance of his life. When sentence was passed upon him Saturday, he gave no legal reason why the judgment of the jury should not be pronounced upon him, and appeared for the first time to realize the enormity of his offense and that he was indeed lucky that a Madison county jury had not been asked to hear the case. With the exception of a few people, and a majority of these were not near the court house during the trial, the verdict gives satisfaction in this section and the opinion is freely expressed that his youth alone saved his neck.

Lyman B. Duckworth, convicted of horse stealing and sentenced to five years in prison, also accompanied Wolff to Deer Lodge, and they were landed in the pen by Sheriff Padley about midnight last night.

TENNIS THE POPULAR SPORT

Golf and Kindred Games Driven Out of the Field by the Tennis Racket.

Anaconda, June 3.—The most popular sport in Anaconda at the present time seems to be lawn tennis, to the total exclusion of golf.

A number of new courts have been laid out in different parts of the city; they are just across from the Margaret theater, being especially fine.

In building this court the stones were first removed and the ground covered with a layer of sand. Upon this was placed a thick layer of clay from up the valley. A huge roller was then obtained and the court subjected to a rolling process which left it as smooth and as hard as glass.

INDEPENDENCE DAY PLANS.

City Council Will Tackle the Proposition Tonight—The City Ought to Celebrate.

Anaconda, June 2.—The city council will meet tonight and probably the most important matter to come up for consideration will be the Fourth of July celebration proposition.

Myer Stephens is endeavoring with patriotic instincts and declares that Anaconda must celebrate. At any rate he is going to bring the proposition up before the city council tonight in order that they may take some appropriate action.

HE FOUND HUNTER JOHNSON

Anaconda Nimrod and Trapper Turns Up Alive and Well in the Wilds of Wise River.

Anaconda, June 3.—Martin Johnson, a well-known hunter of Anaconda, is reported as being at the head of Wise river, trapping bear very successfully. Johnson left Anaconda about three months ago and had not been heard from since until a few days ago. It was feared for a time that he had met with some serious or perhaps fatal accident in the Big Hole country where he went from here. It is but a few days since that a man who had been in the Wise river country saw him and says that he is safe and sound, enjoying a good hunting season and is uncertain as to when he will return to this city.

PRIZE FOR AN ANACONDA MAN

Appointed General Manager of the Famous Payne Silver Mine in British Columbia.

Anaconda, June 3.—A new general manager of the famous Payne silver mine, in British Columbia, has just been appointed in the person of Alfred C. Garde, formerly of Anaconda. He was assistant superintendent of the Anaconda Copper Mining company and has a large number of friends in that city. He left for Rossland as chief engineer of the Center Star and War Eagle mines a year ago last October.

The Payne mine produces more high-grade silver lead ore than any other mine in the Sloacan camp. An enlarged and modernized plant will soon be installed at the mine.

HARLE WAS BADLY PARALYZED

Great Northern Express Agent in a Critical Condition From a Paralytic Stroke

Anaconda, June 3.—Harry S. Harle, a Great Northern express messenger between Havre and Anaconda, was in St. Ann's hospital as a result of a stroke of paralysis. His wife and children who reside in Havre will arrive here this evening.

Harle was first missed Saturday evening when he failed to go out on his regular run. He was found in his room at 320 West Fourth street, by C. M. Logan, a brother messenger. Harle was unconscious and lying on the floor partially dressed. It was found that his entire left side was paralyzed. He is reported as being in a critical condition.

A resolution creating and defining the boundaries of improvement district No. 26, in the city of Butte, and providing for the paving, curbing and constructing the necessary catch basins within said district. Be It Resolved by the City Council of the City of Butte: Section 1. That improvement district No. 26 in the city of Butte be, and the

same is hereby created, and the boundaries thereof are described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point on the east line of Arizona street, 50 feet north of the north line of Park street; thence easterly and parallel to the north line of Park street to the west line of Thornton avenue; thence southerly along the west line of Thornton avenue to the center line of Park street; thence easterly along the center line of Park street 16 feet; thence northerly along the east line of Thornton avenue to a point 50 feet north of the north line of Park street; thence easterly and parallel to the north line of Park street to the west line of Covert street; thence southerly along the west line of Covert street to the center line of Park street; thence easterly along the center line of Park street 20 feet; thence southerly to a point 50 feet south of the south line of Park street; thence westerly and parallel to the south line of Park street to the east line of Ohio avenue; thence northerly along the east line of Ohio avenue to the center line of Park street; thence southerly along the west line of Ohio avenue to a point 50 feet south of the south line of Park street; thence westerly parallel to the south line of Park street to the east line of Arizona street; thence northerly along the east line of Arizona street to the place of beginning. Section 2. The character of the improvements to be made in said district is paving, curbing and constructing the necessary catch basins upon the streets and alleys therein. Section 3. For the purpose of making said improvements, and in order to extend the payments of assessments therefor in installments to extend over a period of three (3) years, to be paid for special improvements warrants, the property embraced within the boundaries of improvement district No. 26 shall be assessed in proportion to the square feet of the whole of said property, in order to defray the cost of making said improvements. An approximate estimate of the cost thereof is twenty (20) cents per square foot of the assessable property in said improvement district. Section 4. Time for hearing objections to the final adoption of this resolution is hereby set for the 5th day of June, A. D., 1901, at the council chamber of the city of Butte, at the hour of eight o'clock p. m. Section 5. This resolution shall be published in a daily newspaper, published in the city of Butte, for five days prior to the time for hearing said objections; and if the owners or agents of the property representing more than one-half in area of all the property which would be assessed to defray the cost of said improvements fail to make objections at the time mentioned, a majority of the members of the council voting in the affirmative will finally adopt this resolution.
