40 MILES OF RAIL

TOLUCA-CODY BRANCH LAYING STEEL WITH SPEED.

A TRAIN SERVICE ON JUNE 20.

The Burlington Road is Hot After the Great Wyoming Wool Trade—Much of the Clip Will Come to Billings this Year—Expect to Complete the Line this Fall.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Billings, June 4.—The work on the new line of the Burlington railroad from Toluca, Montana, to Cody, Wyoming, a distance of about 150 miles, is progressing very satisfactorily, and unless some unforeseen event occurs the line will be completed by the middle of September or the first of October.

Already rail has been laid for a distance of about 40 miles from Toluca and just as soon as the line reaches Pryor, a distance of 30 miles, an accommodation train will be placed in service. This will be done in order to secure at once the vast amount of freight business that goes into that section of the country and also to get much of the business of Northern Wyoming.

A number of the wool men of that section will ship their clips into this city over the new line, and thus save them a long haul by team. A depot, two-stall engine house, water tank and yards have been constructed at Toluca and everything is in readiness for the running of trains. Depots are being built at the various points along the road just as fast as the rail is laid.

WOOL GATHERING AT BILLINGS.

Immense Crop of Last Year Will be Discounted in 1901—Warehouses Too Small to Hold it All.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Billings, June 4.—The shearing of wool through this section is on in earnest now and will be pushed as fast as possible. There seems to be a scarcity of shearers for some reason or other. Considerable more of the shearing will be done by machine this season than last year, but the hand men are not relegated to the rear by any means. The fleeces will weigh about as much as those of last year on the average, although in some instances they will be much lighter. The railroad men anticipate a much larger receipts of wool for this point than was received last year when it reached nearly 11,000,000 pounds. One reason for this is that there are many more sheep in this section than last year, and another that more wool of the northern country will come here by reason of the Montana and Northern Pacific railroads working in conjunction.

The Northern Pacific already has about 30 cars stored in its warehouse, nearly all of it being from the Wyoming country. The latter will not have room for all the wool that it expects to have, and will of necessity have to move it rapidly.

A GREAT INCREASE OF STOCK.

Three Hundred Cars of Cattle Already Shipped in, and Twice as Much to Follow.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Billings, June 4.—The stock lookout was never more promising than at the present time, and the fact that the cattlemen of this section are shipping in thousands of head to supplement their herds is evidence that they have not yet lost hope that the condition of affairs is still satisfactory.

Ten days ago this section was begging for rain while today there is a sufficiency, with a likelihood of having much more, during the next day or two. The rains of last week thoroughly soaked the ground and insured grass for some time to come.

The shipments of cattle to this state this spring will equal those of the past two years. Already over 300 cars have been received in this city and twice as many more are expected by the first of July. The shipments are as follows: L. W. Stacy, 110 cars; Lake Toomb Cattle company, 48; Ryan Bros. Cattle company, 54; Bloom Cattle company, 90.

KING'S GENIUS FOR CLOTHES. Ceremonial Side of Royalty Takes New Lease of Life—English Court Is Gay With Finery.

(By Associated Press.) New York, June 4.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says:

As the king has a marked talent for arranging court functions and supervising details, the ceremonial side of royalty is gradually developing. The recent investiture was enlarged into a brilliant and picturesque function, with an abundance of color and gold lace.

The gold stick, the silver stick, the garter king at arms and the white staves and chief of officer of the royal household were in attendance in the throne room with the yeomen of the guard within and guards of honor outside St. James. The investiture was accomplished with a great degree of stateliness in the presence of a large company of distinguished officers, including General Roberts, General Buller, General Forester-Walker, General Pole-Carew, General Clary, General Brackenbury, General McKinnon and other veterans of the South African war.

A TITLED ENGLISH MURDERER.

Went Insane and Shot His Cook for a Burglar. (By Associated Press.)

Vancouver, B. C., June 4.—A special from Golden, B. C., says that Hon. Frank Lascelles, a wealthy English ranch owner, residing on Thunder Hill, shot and killed his Chinese cook, Lascelles is related to the Earl of Harewood and is a cousin of Sir Frank Lascelles, British ambassador to Germany.

Lascelles became demented through brooding over a fancied insult in connection with his being called to give evidence in a suit over the ownership of a horse, and accused his cook, who had served him for five years, of being a burglar. After his arrest Lascelles became a raving maniac.

Special interest is taken in the affair throughout British Columbia, owing to the prominence of the Lascelles family.
