A COLD AND GLAMMY FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATION PROMISED

The Great Patriotic American Public Suddenly Does Not Rush to the Rescue of Independence Day—Firecrackers, Sky Rockets and Lurid Oratory at a Discount in Anaconda This Year.

He waited there patiently for more than a half hour, but none of his colleagues put in an appearance, so he took an adjournment and came on uptown. There are a great many good citizens in Anaconda who regret that the plan to hold a grand old fashioned celebration has practically fallen through with the time left so short it is extremely doubtful that anything further will be done with the proposition.

CAUSE OF CONNOLLY'S DEATH

Coroner's Jury Decides That Undue Use of Alcoholic Stimulants Brought About His Demise.
(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Anaconda, June 12.—An inquest was held last evening by Coroner Joseph Hughes over the remains of Thomas Connolly, who dropped dead in front of Turner hall Monday afternoon. The verdict of the jury was to the effect that death was due to causes unknown, said causes being brought about by the excessive use of alcoholic stimulants.

The first witness, young Raymond Trask, testified that as he was passing along the street about 4:30 o'clock, Connolly came out of Turner hall, waved his arms, staggered and fell. The boy gave the alarm, and the men inside the hall came out and a doctor was sent for. Connolly was dead when the physician arrived.

Harry Fritz testified that on Sunday night he and Connolly had been drinking together. He took Connolly to his room and they slept until 11 o'clock Monday morning. After rising they had three drinks before breakfast. In the afternoon they met Frank Blake who asked them to go with him to Turner hall, as he wanted to punch the bag.

After punching the bag for a short time, Fritz and Blake went upon the stage to swing Indian clubs and lift heavy weights. Connolly then had his coat off striking lightly at the bag. When the two returned Connolly was gone and it was just then Trask ran into the hall.

Fritz and Blake carried Connolly into the but he died before the doctor arrived. Fritz said Connolly was a hard drinker.

Frank Blake told the same story. Dr. J. F. Spelman was the last witness and testified that Connolly was dead when he arrived on the scene and that an autopsy would be the only means of determining the exact cause of the death.

DEFUNCT REGULAR BALL TEAM

Eagles Will Absorb Their Players and Dates, and Keep the Fans Busy.

Anaconda, June 12.—The Anaconda base ball team was disbanded last night and a new one immediately reorganized to take its place. The new team will be known as the "Eagles," with M. M. Day, Buffalo No. 1, manager. Manager Day telegraphed last night for the dates at Missoula and Butte which were to have been played by the old team.

The line-up of the new team will be practically the same as of yore. The Anaconda games will in all probability be played at Athletic park, Carroll.

Games will be arranged later with Livingston, Bozeman, Helena and Great Falls.

As regards the disbanding of the Anaconda team Manager Frank Clinton was seen this morning and disclaimed all knowledge of it.

"The team had no regular meeting last night," said Manager Clinton. "A number of us just happened to come together on the street. We talked base ball, of course, but nothing was said about disbanding. As it will be impossible for several of the boys to get off Miners' Union day, we decided to cancel the Butte game of that date. I don't know anything about the new team. I saw several of the boys today and none of them knew anything about it. We have the best team in the state. Why should we disband?"

From this it would seem that it was somebody's turn to guess again.

FACE OF A SPIRIT.

Snapshot of a Dog Reveals Countenance of a Dead Child.

In a photograph taken a few days ago by Dr. L. B. Griffing, a prominent physician of Danbury, there appears, distinctly outlined, the face of a child who died several years ago in the house where the picture was taken.

Believers in spiritual phenomena are inclined to think that Dr. Griffing has photographed a spirit face. He is endeavoring to obtain a more tangible solution. The photograph is an ordinary snap-shot taken of a dog belonging to one of his patients. It was snapped in a large and well lighted room, and the plate was taken from a newly opened package. Dr. Griffing discovered the presence of the face in the picture soon after the negative came from the developer.

He went to the room where he had taken the photograph, to ascertain if a picture of a child had been hanging upon the wall, or could have come within range of the camera. There was no picture of a child in the room. Several people living in the neighborhood identified
