PROJECTORS OF THE NEW COUNTRY CLUB READY TO ACT.

Col. Tom Marshall Drawing Up the Document That Will Give the Organization Life - Membership Is Steadily Growing.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, June 18.—Col. Tom Marshall of Missoula is preparing the articles of incorporation of the new country club to be established near Bonita, on the main line of the Northern Pacific.

The new club will start out with a membership of 40 persons, citizens of the important cities of the state.

The organization has prepared to purchase the Babcock ranch, consisting of 160 acres, with its modern buildings, located in one of the most picturesque mountain spots in the state.

Forty acres of the 160 is hay land, on which enough feed can be raised to supply what stock the members of the club may need.

The buildings are elegantly furnished throughout. A telephone line is to be constructed to Bonita, a distance of 10 miles, which will connect the place with the outside world.

Rock creek, a quarter of a mile from the club house building, teems with mountain trout.

DEMAND FOR MODERN HOMES.

Residents of Anaconda Complain Because the City is Not Supplied With Conveniences.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, June 17.—Anaconda is experiencing great activity in the building line, although no one has yet attempted to erect houses with modern conveniences. Houses of this class are in big demand, and not a day passes but what real estate dealers have enquiries for them.

Really men declare there are excellent opportunities for investments of this kind in Anaconda, and it is regarded as strange that property owners, who have vacant lots do not erect a few up-to-date flats, terraces or cottages.

One real estate man said to the Inter Mountain representative that he would be willing to put a bond to anyone going to this expense to keep a certain number of modern buildings of this kind supplied

with tenants for a period of two years at good rentals. He would make this proposition, he said, merely as an inducement to get capital interested in filling a long felt want in Anaconda.

HORSE BUYERS FILL FORSYTH

Men From All Over the United States Attending the Greatest Sale in the History of the United States.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Forsyth, Mont., June 18.—One hundred and twenty-five horse buyers, from the Middle western states, are here attending the horse sale, which opened yesterday at this place.

The first day's sales were not heavy, but the prices were remarkably good, but the buyers were buying tentatively and better things are promised. Eleven carloads were sold yesterday, six in the afternoon and five in the evening, a total of 278 horses. Prices range from \$26.50 to \$30 per head for 2-year-olds and from \$30 to \$45 per head for 3, 4 and 5-year-olds. The sale is to last ten days and the buyers will remain all that time.

Fletcher Bros. are the chief sellers and are the promoters of the sale. J. S. Cooper of Chicago is in general charge and I. C. Gallup of South Omaha is the auctioneer.

Gallup sells from the back of a horse in a corral with the buyers in one corner or on the fence, and the 24 or 30 horses which constitute the lot in another. Sales are by the carload.

It is promised that this will be the greatest horse sale ever conducted in the west, if not in the country. The owners hope to sell nearly 1,000 carloads during the ten days.

The horses that are being sold are all range stock, but pure American bred. So far no riding horses have been sold nor is it expected that many will be, hence army purchasers are not on hand. The horses range from 950 to 1,500 pounds in weight and are draught and driving animals, some beautiful specimens being in the bunch.

RANGE POISONING ALLEGED

Officer Leaves Boulder to Arrest a Man Who Is Accused of a Grave Crime.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Boulder, Mont., June 18.—An officer left here yesterday to arrest L. C. Harris of Montana City, in the northern part of the county, who is charged with scattering poison on the range near Montana City and East Helena.

The complaint is made by P. J. Raymond, who has a band of 1,000 sheep in that locality, and is based on the threats that Harris is alleged to have made that he would drive the sheep out of that section, and also on the discovery of buggy tracks from the point where the saltpeter was found to the vicinity of the place where Harris lives.

The poisoning of the range is quite a serious matter, with a penitentiary punishment attached if proved.

MORMONS TO OCCUPY MEXICO

Agent Is Now Trying to Secure a Concession of Land Upon Which to Settle a Colony.

(By Associated Press.) Mexico City, June 18.—James Cannon, a Mormon agent, is here for the purpose of securing from the government a concession for settling 1,000 Mormons in Sonora, on the lands from which the Yaqui Indians have been driven. Mr. Cannon says:

"We believe that if suitable tracts of lands are placed at our disposal in the Yaqui country we will do much in this country in the interest of peace, for the Mormon church has faced the Indian problem almost since its organization."

"We require no rifles in our management of the red brother and are always instilling into his mind that we are his friends and not his foes."

"If the concession is obtained, a commissioner will be sent at once into the Yaqui territory by the Mormon church for the purpose of ascertaining the attitude of the Indians, and if peaceful, a contract will be made and lands purchased from the Yaquis."

IRRIGATION TO BE DISCUSSED

Western State Engineers Will Take Up Important Matters in Cheyenne Thursday.

(By Associated Press.) Cheyenne, Wyo., June 18.—The meeting of Western State Engineers, which will be held here Thursday, promises to be an interesting one.

The subject of irrigation, government aid, state and federal laws, will be discussed, and the engineers will unite on a plan of action in the shape of recommendations to congress.

Among those who will be present are: State Engineers A. Dobson of Nevada, A. J. McCune and Assistant John Field of Colorado, and D. W. Ross of Idaho.

The adjourned meeting of senators and representatives from the arid and semi-arid states and territories, called to meet here Thursday, will also be largely attended, and the proceedings will be of much interest and importance to the citizens of the arid west.

Senators Warren and Clark and Representative Mondell of Wyoming will be present and delegations will attend from Nebraska, Utah, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas and New Mexico.

The irrigation problem, land leasing, fencing and other matters of vital importance to the states in the Rocky Mountain region will be discussed.

UNDER ONE MANAGEMENT HEREAFTER

HARRIMAN, MORGAN, VANDERBILT AND HILL ROADS ARE AFFECTED.

Lines in the West and Middle West Will Be Handled from Chicago by J. C. Stubbs and Darius Miller, Who Are to Make Rates and See That the Same Are Maintained.

(By Associated Press.) Chicago, June 18.—All the roads in the middle west and northwest in which E. H. Harriman and J. Pierpont Morgan, the Vanderbilts and J. J. Hill are interested hereafter will practically be under one management.

J. C. Stubbs, third vice president of the Southern Pacific, will be traffic expert, or manager, for the Harriman group of roads, and Darius Miller, second vice president of the Great Northern, will occupy a similar position for the Hill roads. Both men probably will have offices in Chicago and will act in conjunction.

This is one result of the conference in Chicago, Thursday, between Mr. Harriman and various railway men.

Mr. Stubbs will have full charge of all the traffic affairs of the Union Pacific, Southern Pacific, Oregon Short Line and Oregon Railway and Navigation company. He will have charge of the transcontinental traffic affairs of the Chicago & Northwestern, Chicago & Alton, Illinois Central, Milwaukee & St. Paul, and one or two other lines which may come under Harriman control.

Mr. Miller, who is one of President Hill's trusted lieutenants, will be one of the traffic experts of the Burlington, Great Northern and Northern Pacific, and to these may be added later the Chicago-Great Western, Wisconsin Central and the Minneapolis & St. Louis Central.

Mr. Miller, it is understood, will also be made second vice president of the Burlington road. Mr. Stubbs and Mr. Miller will act in unison on all transcontinental competitive matters.

The making of rates will be in their hands, and it will be their duty to see to it that rates are firmly maintained. Their headquarters, it is said, will be in Chicago, and the traffic affairs of this vast railway combine will be directed from this city.

It is believed the several delegations will unite on a plan, bills will be drawn and a campaign for the coming session of congress will be arranged.

Western senators and congressmen now see that if anything is to be gained at all it must come through united efforts.

It is said that about twenty men are being worked on the Gray Eagle mine near Comet. Ex-Governor Lind of Minnesota and others have an eighteen months' lease and bond on the property. The mine is owned by J. J. Holmes and the Dahlman estate.
