OGLESBY KNOCKS OUT MADDEN

The Boston Boy No Match for the Helena Fighter—Lasts Ten Rounds.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Helena, June 26.—A big crowd saw "Kid" Oglesby of Helena knock out "Kid" Madden of Boston at the Coliseum last night. The knockout came at the beginning of the 10th round, when Oglesby landed a left hook on the point of Madden's jaw.

Madden was unconscious for half an hour, and for a time two doctors who were working over him thought the consequences might be serious.

The fight was for \$200 and the gate receipts. It was advertised as a 20-round fight, but a finish was expected. Jack O'Mara refereed the fight and Bill Hermann was official time keeper.

The men weighed in at 126 pounds. Oglesby had the best of the fight from the first, clearly outclassing the Boston boy. He forced the fighting, landing repeatedly. Madden went to his knees twice before the knockout. He was game, however, and possessed considerable endurance. Madden is said to be champion lightweight of the Pacific coast.
