**MONTANA MINERS GO TO TENNESSEE COPPER FIELDS**

**Boston & Montana Company Opening Up New Properties in the South—Experienced Men From Montana Will Be Sent to Develop the Rich Holdings in Dixie Land.**

A. L. Rich, for many years sampler at the Boston & Montana smelters in Great Falls, was in the city this morning, leaving today for Isabella, Tennessee, where he goes to take charge of the converter floor of the large new smelters soon to be opened at that place by the Boston & Montana company. Speaking of the prospects, as far as he is informed, Mr. Rich said:

"The company is going to develop the rich copper mines of the Tennessee district, and expects to do a great business there. I do not know the extent of the copper deposits, but I am told they are known to be very extensive, though not as yet fully prospected, and the ore is phenomenally rich. It runs about 35 per cent copper, free milling ore, and should be a bonanza. The mines have never been worked to amount to much. But with 35 per cent copper,

**BUSY AT THE NEW SMELTER**

**Superintendent Hickey of Anaconda Talks of Operations at the Washoe Smelter.**

Superintendent Hickey, manager of the foundry department of the A. C. M. company at Anaconda, was in Butte for a short time today, on business connected with his work.

"The new works are taking about all our time over at Anaconda," said Mr. Hickey. "Everything is moving along as smoothly as could be desired, and the new blast furnaces, which will probably be the first of the Washoe works to be finished, will be in operation this year; probably several other departments also will be ready for service."

"Anyone who wishes to see a really great job of building carried to a successful conclusion should go over to the Smelter City and look over the Washoe smelters."

"The new works will be even nearer to the city than the old ones, and will be more convenient for the workmen who now live in the city. There will be no need of a separate community, and it is not likely that one will be built up, at least for the present."

**BUT FEW BANKRUPTS IN BUTTE**

**Only Fifty-five Petitions Filed in the Federal Court During Past Year.**

During the year ending June 30 fifty-five petitions in bankruptcy were filed in the federal court in Butte, almost equally divided between voluntary and involuntary cases.

All these went through the hands of Thompson Campbell, referee in bankruptcy, and a good many have been settled. Some, however, especially the later ones, are still on the books, for the clerks, the judge and the lawyers to worry over.

The number is not proportionately large, considering the large number of firms, large and small, doing business in the city and nearby territory.

If, as is frequently asserted, every business man fails at least once in his life, a good many Butte men will have to live to a ripe old age before it comes their turn to turn up their business toes and call upon the law to wind up their affairs.

**LOW RATES ON THE RAILROADS**

**Managers of the Coming Street Fair and Carnival Secures a Reduction in Fare.**

All the railroads entering Butte have agreed to give a rate of one and one-third fare for round-trip tickets to the street fair for all distances under 100 miles, the tickets to be good for five days.

A special rate will also be given for five days of the fair, the dates not yet being arranged, when round-trip tickets will be sold at one fare for the round trip, tickets good for three days.

"We're going to have a crowd from the rural districts," said one of the leading spirits in the railroad world of Butte. "If we have to arm our track walkers and section men with double-barreled shotguns and have them scour the country like a swarm of grasshoppers."

"The people outside of Butte don't know how good a time is going to be offered them, and, by George, we're going to show them! Many of them came from Missouri and may need to be shown before they will believe."

"They can walk in, or come a-wheel, or get aboard a bucking broncho and steer him in by painful stages, or they can come in on comfortable passenger cars, but they've got to come and see the sights. And they will do so, you can count on that."

**ANOTHER STRONG MINING COMPANY OPERATING IN BUTTE.**

The Butte Mining & Development company is sinking a three compartment shaft at the corner of Silver and Colorado streets. The shaft is down 350 feet and the indications for a great mine are very encouraging. The vein on which the company is sinking is the largest in Butte. It has always been known as the Mother Lode of the camp. The plant consists of three eighty horse power boilers, a five drill air compressor, which does away with hand drilling, an engine capable of hoisting from a depth of 1,200 feet, powerful pumps, tanks, cars, blacksmith shop, shaft house, lumber yard, etc. A force of twenty-five experienced miners is putting the shaft down at the rate of 80 feet per month.
