New York, July 16.—The Grangers and Pacific Southwestern led an opening advance in prices, which was quite general. The first sale of United States Steel was of 15,000 shares at simultaneous prices of 38 1/4 to 38 3/8, compared with 38 1/2 last night. North American rose 1/4.

Gus Ruhlin, aspirant for the heavyweight championship of the world and who but a week ago defeated Bob Fitzsimmons in a wrestling match at the Madison Square Gardens in New York city is in Butte. Ruhlin is accompanied by Billy Madden, the famous fight promoter, and Denver Ed Martin. Mrs. Madden and son are also traveling with the party on their way to San Francisco, where Ruhlin is going to arrange for a fight with big Jim Jeffries.

Ruhlin will appear at the Grand opera house tomorrow night in an exhibition of the many art of self-defense with Denver Ed Martin as sparring partner. The performance will be most interesting in that every minute detail of a fighters position, guard, delivery, get-away and attacks will be fully demonstrated by the big fighter and his training partner. Nothing similar to the Ruhlin-Martin exhibition has yet been given and as there will be other attractions the entertainment will doubtless be well received.

Mr. Madden states that he will give \$50 to any man in Butte who will stay four rounds with Martin at the exhibition tomorrow night. Mr. Madden states that he prefers to have the local fighter, Hayes, take on the opportunity but will entertain any other proposition made to him.

TODAY'S WOOL SALES.

"Yesterday's wool sale at Fort Benton were the largest for a single day in the history of the state," said Archibald Gray, of the Great Northern. "A total of 1,119,600 pounds was sold, at an average of a little better than 14 cents. The firm of J. Kosland & Co. bought 361,000 pounds, and Jeremiah Williams & Co., 455,000 pounds. The average daily sales at Great Falls are about 400,000 pounds. The great record at Fort Benton is due to the fact that the buyers had decided to but one day at present to that place, and they went prepared to buy on short notice. They cleaned up all the wool on the Benton market, for the present, and will now remain at Great Falls until another lot accumulates at Benton. The highest price paid was 15 1/2 cents, for the Evans Brothers' clip of 60,000 pounds. "The high price was equalled today at Great Falls, nineteen clips being sold on the market, aggregating 388,000 pounds, at an average price of 14 3/8 cents a pound. The lowest price paid was 11 cents for a small quantity of inferior wool. The highest was 15 1/2, the same as paid at Fort Benton yesterday. "These prices stamp the Great Falls as the best in the whole west, this year. The prices are the best, and so far, the quantity handled is the largest."
