BICYCLE TRACK WASHED AWAY

GREAT HAVOC WORKED BY THE RECENT HEAVY STORMS.

Road Between Anaconda and Gregson Springs Damaged in Many Places—President Brown Says Injury Can Easily Be Repaired—Plan to Make All Wheelmen Pay a Yearly License Being Agitated.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, July 16.—The heavy rain storms that have prevailed during the last few weeks have played havoc with the bicycle path between Anaconda and Gregson Springs.

"In a number of places," said President Brown of the Cycle Path and Good Roads association, last night, "these heavy rain storms have caused the irrigation ditches to overflow and wash out the track, quite badly, but all the places can be repaired with comparatively little trouble."

"To guard against future trouble of this kind the association will have to go to considerable expense in building a few culverts and filling in with ashes and gravel wherever it is needed."

"Of course, we cannot do this work this year, but by next spring the path ought to be in a first-class condition in every respect."

There is agitation among members of the association regarding the matter of petitioning the city council to pass an ordinance requiring all riders to pay a yearly license into the city treasury, the proceeds derived in that manner to be applied to the betterment and improvement of bicycle paths.

The plan is being operated successfully in the east, and Anaconda wheelmen are enthused since the matter was broached here. So far, not an objection has been raised by members of the association, and there is little doubt appropriate action will be taken at an early date.

FIRST GAME AT BOISE CITY

Burns hails from Stillwater, Minn., the home of several of the best players Anaconda has ever had.

Repairing the Race Track.

Anaconda, July 16.—The race track west of town, where the races of the Montana Jockey club will begin Aug. 6, is being given a thorough going over and treated to a series of repairs. The mile track is being put in condition and when the flag is dropped on the first race the course will be as good, if not better, than any in Montana. Where needed new floors and roofs are being placed on the buildings and the whole subjected to a fresh coat of paint. Stalls and stables are being whitewashed throughout. Suit on a Promissory Note.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, July 16.—Daniel James, through his attorney, John H. Duffy, begun suit in the district court this morning against George B. O'Neal to recover fifty dollars and interest at the rate of one and one-half per cent per month from October 16, 1896, the amount of the promissory note, which the plaintiff signed as surety and was compelled to pay. The plaintiff asks judgement for \$7.87. As a second cause of action the plaintiff claims the defendant is indebted to him to the amount of \$80 for an account assigned to him by one C. B. Jones, and asks further judgement for that amount.

Mrs. D. B. Murphy Dead.
