LATE NEWS FROM THE TRACK.

The features of today's card at the race track was the owners' handicap at five furlongs, for all ages. There were but three entries—Doublet, Hagerdon and De Capo. Hagerdon was the favorite.

The race was won by Doublet, with Hagerdon second and De Capo third. Time, 1 minute flat.

This broke the record, which has been held by May W., a 2-year-old, since 1896.

The track management had offered \$500 if the record was broken this afternoon, and Doublet proceeded to break it.

The betting record was also broken, the auction pools amounting to more than \$7,000.

The first race, a six furlong selling, was won by Vergie d'Or, at 5 to 2, with Adnor, at 5 to 1, second, and Kenova, at even money, third. Time, 1:15.

SUBSTITUTE FOR COUNCIL BILL NO. 10.

A bill for an ordinance regulating the displacement of pavements in the city of Butte.

ORDINANCE NO. 620.

An ordinance regulating the displacement of pavements in the City of Butte. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Butte:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, company or corporation to open or tear up any of the paved streets of the City of Butte, without first having complied with all of the requirements of the ordinances now in force, or that may hereafter be passed by the City of Butte, and, in addition thereto, shall deposit with the city treasurer of the City of Butte a sum of money sufficient (the amount to be deposited to be in such sum as the city engineer shall estimate as necessary) for the purpose of assuring the replacement of the pavement in absolutely as good order as before being disturbed, the earth packed solid, and the pavement laid even with adjacent blocks or other material, within three weeks after it is first torn up.

Sec. 2. When said deposit of money is made with the city treasurer, as required by section 1 of this ordinance, the city treasurer shall issue duplicate receipts therefor, one of which receipts shall be filed with the city engineer of the city of Butte.

Sec. 3. All replacements of pavement so displaced or removed shall be done by the city engineer of the City of Butte and the cost thereof shall be, by the city engineer, reported to the city council, and the said amount shall be deducted from the deposit, as provided for in section 1 of this ordinance, and the balance, if any there be, remaining after deducting the cost of the replacement of the pavement, as aforesaid, shall, by warrant, be paid to the person depositing the same.

Sec. 4. Any person, company or corporation who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than one hundred (\$100) dollars and not more than three hundred (\$300) dollars.

COUNCIL BILL NO. 15.

A bill for an ordinance creating the office of Assistant Street Commissioner of the City of Butte, and prescribing his duties.

ORDINANCE NO. 622.

An ordinance creating the office of Assistant Street Commissioner of the City of Butte, and prescribing his duties. Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Butte:

Section 1. The office of Assistant Street Commissioner of the City of Butte is hereby created.

Sec. 2. The mayor shall nominate, and, by and with the consent of the city council, appoint a suitable person to hold the office of Assistant Street Commissioner of the City of Butte.

Sec. 3. The duties of the Assistant Street Commissioner shall be such as are by the laws of this state and the ordinances of the City of Butte prescribed for the Street Commissioner. The Assistant Street Commissioner shall perform such duties under the direction and control of the Street Commissioner.

Sec. 4. The Assistant Street Commissioner, before entering upon the duties of his office, shall execute to the City of Butte, and file, as by law required, his official bond in the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000) Dollars.

Sec. 5. The Assistant Street Commissioner shall be paid the sum of One Hundred and Twenty-five (\$125.00) Dollars per month, which shall be in full remuneration for the services rendered by him, said salary to be paid out of the Street and Alley Fund of the City of Butte, in monthly installments.
