NOT ENOUGH DAY COACHES

MODERN WOODMEN EXCURSION TO MISSOULA HAS NARROW ESCAPE.

For a Time It Looked as if Not Enough Cars Could Be Secured for Tomorrow, But the Railway Officials Finally Get Matters Straightened Out, and There Will Be Room for All Who Desire to Go Out.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Anaconda, July 20.—No fewer than 500 people of Anaconda have expressed their intention of going to Missoula tomorrow on the Modern Woodmen excursion, but a serious difficulty arose yesterday which for a time threatened to block all plans and prevent the Anaconda contingent from going.

A list was left at one of the Main street stores for the signatures of those who wished to take advantage of the low rate offered. The passenger department of the B. A. & P. agreed to run a special train to Stuart if the assurances were given that there would be 150 passengers.

Considerable more than the required number signed the list, and it then occurred that a change of cars at Stuart and the chances of getting comfortable seats on the Northern Pacific special from Butte were not overly bright, so an effort was made to secure the equipment from the Northern Pacific to carry the Anaconda crowd through without any changes.

The Northern Pacific was accordingly advised and the response came that the road was suffering from a scarcity of equipment, and it was doubtful if the crowd from the Smelter City could be handled.

The general passenger department at St. Paul was appealed to, and cars from other divisions were ordered released and sent this way to take care of the Sunday excursionists.

The B. A. & P. road is taxed for equipment and could not loan any coaches to the Northern Pacific without crippling its local traffic.

TEAM GOES AWAY TONIGHT

Members of the Anaconda Club in Readiness for Its Trip Through Idaho.

Anaconda, July 20.—The Eagle base ball team will leave tonight on a trip through Idaho. The first game will be at Pocatello tomorrow. From there the team will go to Boise City, where it will play four games. It is the intention of Manager Day to take the team to Huntington, Ore., and possibly to Baker City, if the arrangements can be completed. On the return trip there is but one game scheduled, that being at Dillon.

The line-up of the team making the trip will be as follows: Shuster, 2b; J. McHale, lf; Freeman, 1b; Storey, c; Knox, ss; Smalley, cf; Sullivan, rf; G. McHale, 3b; Burns, p; Hansen, substitute.

Williams, being unable to go, his place will be taken by Freeman, who with Storey will do the catching. The pitching of the seven games already scheduled will develop upon Burns, Knox and Hansen.

Manager Day hopes to win at least five games out of the seven, and possibly more, as he thinks his aggregation of tossers is the strongest in this part of the country.

ROBBED BY COOL BURGLAR

W. J. Hilbert Watches an Unknown Man Tap Cash Drawer in His Store.

Anaconda, July 20.—A lone burglar entered the establishment of W. J. Hilbert on East Park avenue early this morning and secured \$1.10 in cash.

Entrance was effected through a window in the rear. The burglar passed through two rooms and into the front one, where Mr. Hilbert was sleeping. When the robber opened the cash drawer the ringing of the bell awakened Mr. Hilbert, who saw the man, but as his revolver was in the cash drawer he thought it best to raise no disturbance, so got up and walked unconcernedly to the door, the robber in the meantime crouching beneath the counter not two feet away.

Hilbert went out on the street and signalled to a policeman, but while he was doing so the burglar made his escape. Mr. Hilbert is of the opinion that the thief was familiar with the inside of the store and also aware of the fact that he always goes to his home at night, two miles above the city. It so happened last night that he missed the last train.

SUES FOR HEAVY DAMAGES

Father of Boy Who Was Horse-whipped by Joseph Dulong Begins an Action.

Anaconda, July 20.—The horsewhipping administered to 10 year old Fred Barry, on the 10th inst., by Joseph Dulong, formerly foreman of the A. C. M. company's stables on Cedar street, is almost certain to prove an expensive matter to him.

When he was brought before Justice of the Peace Kennedy a fine of \$350 was imposed upon him, but that didn't end the matter, for this morning Fred W. Barry, father of and guardian ad litem of the boy, began an action for damages against Dulong for the sum of \$3,000.

Request Not Yet Granted

Anaconda, July 20.—Judge Napton has not yet decided whether he will grant the petition of the local attorneys for a recess in August or not. The judge said this morning that before he could decide the matter he would have to see how many cases are on the calendar for the September term in Granite county. If it can be arranged so that he can clear up all the business in both counties during September he feels disposed to grant the petition, otherwise it will likely be necessary to hold at least a short session of court in this city the latter part of August, unless everything was put off until November. The next term in Powell county is set for October.

Ban Put on Smoking

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Anaconda, July 20.—Out at the new Washoe smelters orders have been promulgated that hereafter no smoking will be allowed around the buildings, at least until the big plant is started. These orders were put into force as a precaution against fire. Considerable wood-work is used in some of the structures, and as a consequence shavings and chips are scattered about in such a manner that a fire could easily get a start and play havoc. The greatest danger, however, is around the great timber piles. The facilities for fighting fire at the new works are yet very crude, hence those in authority are not going to take any unnecessary chances.

A transcript in the case of Mrs. C. Lalibertz vs. Henry Chord, which was tried in Justice Quane's court recently, was filed in the district court this morning.

Cable, July 20.—Seated upon newly built pine benches in one of the coolest of school houses can be seen six representatives of young America; three are of Scotch descent, three are of Swedish parentage.

In these days of organized city schools one feels as though a bit of history had been endowed with life, when coming upon such a bit of Americanism as is embodied in that little building upon the crest of a knoll, guarded by the forest-covered hills, close to a mountain torrent that ceaselessly sings its "hallelujah" chorus to the pine.

In a district twelve miles long, with very little assessable property, with the majority of the children usually at the upper end, there seemingly was no way by which the public money could be used. But as the children grew older their needs became greater and must be heeded.

A prominent stock holder's influence was exerted and the board of trustees offered, upon the providing of a suitable place, a portion of the funds in their control.

The little building first spoken of was the result. Coming as the Irish fairy

tales do, "from the hills," came those who wished the enterprise success. Wood choppers, miners, stone masons, Union soldiers, engineers, women and children each and every one cheerfully helped from foundation to ridge-pole; finished for an initial term of two months the builders have named it the Needmore School. May the future show a means of providing this, is the hope of those interested.

A dispatch from Memphis, Tenn., says: "Under a ruling from the state supreme court last week, from which two judges dissented, women can not practice law in the Tennessee courts. Miss Marion Griffin of this city is a bright and ambitious young woman, well grounded in

low. She has been admitted to practice before courts here. Apprehending that some of her cases would eventually be taken up on appeals, Miss Griffin sought recognition from the supreme court. The majority of the court decided that in the pursuance of their profession lawyers become officers of the court before which they are pleading, and that state law prohibits women from holding public office save under special permission granted by the legislature. They decided that legislative enactment is a prerequisite to the practice of law by women. Judge Wilkes and Judge Caldwell dissented, contending that the majority view was altogether too great a strain upon reason and the eternal fitness of things.
