SAW TAKES OFF FINGER

FORMER COUNTY ASSESSOR SCHWEND THE VICTIM OF AN ACCIDENT.

Familiarity With a Wood Cutting Machine Makes Owner a Trifle Careless, and He Drops One of His Hands Upon the Rapidly Revolving Teeth—General News of Anaconda.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, July 23.—Former County Assessor J. S. Schwend met with a serious accident yesterday, in which he lost the index finger of his right hand and suffered a severe laceration of the member next to it. Mr. Schwend is the owner of a big steam wood saw, and it was while he was engaged in working with it in the yards of the Anaconda Coal company that he met with the accident. Mr. Schwend was seen yesterday shortly after his wounds had been dressed by the physicians and he said he was at a loss to know just what caused the accident, any more than that he was perhaps not as careful as he might have been. Mr. Schwend had reached over to turn off the valve which regulates the operation of the pump when his fingers were caught in the revolving saw. The index finger was taken off at the middle joint. The other, although severely cut, will be saved.

SHOOTING OVER A WOMAN

Anaconda Colored Man Tries to Put Bullets Into a Man of Whom He's Jealous.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, July 23.—"Slim" Morrison, colored, yesterday fired three shots at another negro, named Washington, without any of them taking effect. The cause of the trouble is Morrison's wife, a white woman. Morrison thought Washington was paying too much attention to her, and for this reason his feeling arose. Last evening Morrison, who lives near Lake Park, was returning home when he met Washington. After a few hot words Morrison pulled a revolver and began shooting. The woman left town several days ago, supposedly for Butte. Morrison will have a hearing Thursday.

Ordered Out of the County.

Anaconda, July 23.—John Ellswick, charged with vagrancy and insanity was arraigned this morning in Justice Quane's court and given until 3 o'clock this afternoon to get out of Deer Lodge county. Ellswick was arrested several days ago while hunting for a gun, poison or other means whereby he could end his own life.
