

LATE NEWS FROM THE TRACK.

This was a great betting day on the track and the books did a big business. The day was an ideal one for racing and the track fairly fast. There was no harness race and consequently no delays. The talent selected Ned Dennis at 6 to 5 with Derby up to land in the first race, five and a half furlongs, but there was nothing to race except Lucy White at 7 to 2, who beat out the favorite handily. Blanche Sheppard, 8 to 1, third. Time, 1:13 1/2. Ellis Glenn, 3 to 1, Julia Gyp, 15 to 1, and St. Anthony, 10 to 1, also ran.

In the second race, a brush at six furlongs, Foul Play was made the favorite at 4 to 5, and rewarded her backers by coming home with the money, a head in front of Ping at 7 to 2, who beat out Toribolo, 4 to 1. Time, 1:15 1/2. It was a great race with an exciting ride down the stretch and a close finish. William Boyer, 20 to 1, and Cushion, 8 to 1, also ran.

The greatest betting race was in the third race, when Kenova sold readily at \$50 in the auction pools, with St. Germain second choice at \$40. In the books Kenova was the favorite at 4 to 5, with Tingaling in next demand at 3 to 2. Burdock was 3 to 1, St. Germain, 5 to 1, Peck Scout 3 to 1 and Major King 50 to 1. The winner was Kenova easily, with Tingaling second and St. Germain third. Time, 1:50.

William Coconougher began suit today against Samuel M. Wade to recover judgment for \$250, with interest at the rate of 2 per cent a month from December 1, 1899. The amount, it is alleged, is due on a promissory note executed on the date mentioned and due three months later.

A petition in bankruptcy was filed in the federal court this afternoon, in which William F. Mahews, a teamster, seeks the aid of the court in settling his accounts. He has some old accounts as assets, papers left over from a fire which destroyed his place of business in 1896, when he had a butcher shop here in Butte.

George A. Lowe, the Salt Lake City millionaire, who together with his wife, daughter, Miss Margaret Park and Mrs. Josephine Whitney, have been making a tour of Yellowstone Park, are registered at the Thornton. The party attended the races today and will leave this evening for their home in the Mormon capital.

A delivery team belonging to Brobeck, the grocer, took a spin down Main street this morning, turning west on Park, where it was finally stopped. The horse was not of the wild, untamable race horse kind, and ran so slowly as to do no damage, or cause much apprehension. The crowd interested itself hugely in the outcome. Nothing was injured.
