## READY FOR LABOR DAY

### CENTRAL TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL OF ANACONDA WORKING HARD.

Encouraging Replies Are Received From Unions in All Parts of the State, and Indications Are That the Celebration Will Be One of the Greatest Events in the History of Montana.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, Aug. 7.—The Labor day committee of the Central Trades and Labor Council of Anaconda is extremely busy preparing for the celebration to making arrangements for the accommodation and entertainment of the immense crowd expected to be here on that date.

The invitation extended by the council to all the unions in the state has been well received and communications are pouring in to Secretary Regan from every part of the state regarding the number of people that may be expected from various points.

"I cannot state positively," said Secretary Regan last night, "but I have every reason in the world to believe there will be at least 3,000 people from outside points in Anaconda on Labor day."

"Our celebration promises to be the biggest thing of the kind ever held in the state. We are receiving encouragement from every portion of the state and I am getting letters every day telling me of parties, and of whole unions, that intend coming. A great many of these, too are from distant parts of the state."

It was the desire of the council to combine with the Butte organization to celebrate the day, the Butte men coming to Anaconda. Butte, however, had already made arrangements for a celebration and hence could not accept the invitation.

The entire program of the day's doings will be arranged before many days. The committee intends having everything arranged in plenty of time and every step possible is being taken to further the progress of the work.

### DETESTED BY THE CONVICTS

Persinger, Who Aided in Convicting McArthur and Dotson; Not a Favorite.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, Aug. 7.—Ellis Persinger, serving a 10-year sentence in the state penitentiary in Deer Lodge for having been implicated in the Cullinan murder, several years ago, is not allowed to keep company with his fellow-prisoners.

One of the prison attendants explained why this was last Sunday. Persinger, it will be remembered, was one of the principal witnesses for the state in the recent trials of James McArthur and Clinton Dotson. In fact, it was he who revealed the murderous plot to Warden Conley, several weeks before the murder of Captain Oliver Dotson, and after the tragedy the information he imparted to the officers of the conversations between McArthur and Clinton Dotson while they were both in the penitentiary, aided materially in sending them to the gallows.

The convicts have no love for Persinger since he told what he knew. Their enmity towards him is bitter just now, and the prison attendants believe the convicts would not hesitate to kill Persinger if they were given a chance. On several occasions when they have seen him, all joined in hissing and flinging vile epithets at him.

Persinger, of course is not required to participate in the daily "hop step," but he gets plenty of exercise about the prison yard when the other convicts are locked in their cells.

Everyone around the prison expects Persinger's term in the pen will be cut short on account of his service to the state in the recent trials of McArthur

### CASES IN THE DISTRICT COURT

Dr. N. S. Snyder Arraigned and Pleads Not Guilty to Assault in the Second Degree.

Anaconda, Aug. 7.—The divorce case of Labeau vs. Labeau was dismissed without prejudice.

In the case of William Wallace vs. L. J. Hendrickson, a fine of \$25 in contempt was ordered entered against defendant for disobeying the mandates of the court relative to water right proceedings.

In the case of L. J. Hamilton vs. M. J. FitzPatrick and T. C. Davidson, an order was made for issuance of execution.

Dr. N. S. Snyder, arrested for assault in the second degree, on complaint of Dr. J. T. Spellman, in St. Ann's hospital, several weeks ago, appeared for arraignment. His attorneys waived the reading of the information by the county attorney and a plea of not guilty was entered. By consent the trial of the case was continued for the term.

In the matter of the estate of Marcus Daly, deceased, a number of claims were received and ordered filed.

In the case of Daniel James vs. G. B. O'Neill, hearing of demurrer set for Saturday.

Frank Pasquali, an Italian who figured in a stabbing affray on Commercial avenue the night of July 3, pleaded not guilty, and his case was continued over the term.

The marriage will come as a surprise to the many friends of the couple in this city, as it has been kept secret until today.

Miss Quirk is one of Anaconda's most charming and popular young women, numbering her friends by the score. She has lived in Anaconda for the past two years, coming here from Milwaukee.

Edward Davis has been a resident of Anaconda for several years, coming here from Pocatello, Idaho. He holds a responsible position in the foundry department of the A. C. M. company. He is a prominent member of the local Elk lodge.

In the Elks minstrel show last spring he made a distinct hit, as he also did in the leading part of the cantata "Queen Esther," produced here in June last under the auspices of the Epworth League.

### FOLLOWED BY MISFORTUNES

Old Resident of Anaconda, Once an Honored Citizen, Sentenced for Vagrancy.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, Aug. 7.—Con Dineen, arrested last night on a charge of vagrancy, was arraigned in Justice Quane's court this morning, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 60 days in the county jail.

Although sentenced for vagrancy, Dineen, an old time citizen of Anaconda and at one time a much respected, is the recipient of much sympathy from those who are aware of the misfortunes that have followed him.

He was at one time employed in the smelters here. He has had one of his legs broken three different times, the last time leaving him maimed for life unable to do any hard work.

His only source of revenue was from light work performed around saloons, which enabled him to pick up odd quarters and half dollars. Engaged in this capacity, liquor got the best of him until he reached a stage where he was unable to take care of himself.

### ROBBED IN THE "BAD LANDS"

Missoula Man Has Fun That Costs Him Nearly One Thousand Dollars.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, Aug. 7.—A Missoulian en route to Canada stopped in Anaconda last night and visited the bad lands, where he was relieved of \$780. He had on his person \$2,500 in notes and mortgages that were taken.

Jamie Wright and Kate Sullivan, colored inhabitants of Mainville, were later arrested, charged with the robbery, it is happened while Duquette was in the Wright woman's house.

The Missoulian was in the company of two friends who will be called upon to identify the women in the police court this afternoon. Another negro suspected as being implicated in the affair is being searched for by the police.

William Jenkins, colored, arrested on a charge of vagrancy, proved to be a friend of the Sullivan woman. He will appear in the police court this morning.

### GAMBLING LAWS ARE OBEYED

No Slot Machines or Other Games Being Operated in Anaconda.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, Aug. 7.—The gambling laws of the state are seemingly being lived up to in Anaconda, and some of the recent offenders have announced their willingness to submit to the mandates of the attorney general.

The owners of slot machines particularly are ready to obey the law since the sheriff's force has undertaken to prosecute two of Anaconda's well known business men for conducting these automatic devices.

Deputy Sheriff Daly, who now bears the title of "Daly, the Slot Machine Sleuth," has made a diligent search of the town and is unable to discover any place where the law is being violated.

"I think," said the deputy today, "that the arrests made will serve as a warning to others, and I do not anticipate any more trouble."

"There is no use talking—we have our orders to enforce the law, and the sheriff's office will do it without fear or favor. We don't wish to cause any hardship for anyone, and I don't think anyone should attempt to disobey the law after having had fair warning."

Sheriff Conley says: "They had me upon the carpet for not enforcing the gambling law, and now I intend to have somebody else upon the carpet if they don't live up to it."

Mr. Mettler waited upon Judge Napton at noon in an effort to secure the consent of the court to file information against the accused men without going through the formality of a preliminary hearing, but the judge had previously heard objections to such proceedings, which insisted on a hearing before Justice Kennedy, before whom the attorney general had filed his complaint. The informations had not been filed at a late hour this afternoon.

### Action in Gambling Cases.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, Aug. 6.—Assistant Attorney General F. W. Mattler, of Helena, arrived in the city last night and is registered at the Montana. He came here for the purpose of looking after the prosecution of the gambling cases against W. J. Johnson, Charles Graham and others, which were scheduled to come up for hearing before Justice Kennedy tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. Mr. Mettler was in consultation with County Attorney Duffy relative to the cases today.

ENTIRE CLIP SOLD AT ONCE

Transfer of the Silver Bow Wool at Great Falls the Feature of the Market.

Great Falls, Aug. 7.—The feature at the Great Falls wool exchange yesterday was the sale of the entire wool clip of Silver Bow.

It is true there were other wool clips, but the sight of the entire wool clip of the richest mining country on the face of the earth going in one bunch took away the breath of the spectators.

The Silver Bow county clip belonged to T. C. Miles of Grassy Springs, and weighed in at 7,000 pounds and sold for 13-4 cents, more test money to the fact that Silver Bow comes in of a better quality than Silver Bow wool—at least this year. Besides the wool clip of Silver Bow a quarter of a million pounds were sold yesterday.

### DAMAGE BY FOREST FIRES

Blazes in the Missoula District Causing Anxiety to the Residents.

Missoula, Aug. 7.—Forest fires have started almost simultaneously on all sides of Missoula and a pall of smoke hangs over the hills.

A stiff breeze has aided in dispelling the smoke from the valley and this morning the air is clearer than it has been for several days.

The heaviest of the fires is reported to be in the foothills of the Bitter Root mountains nearly opposite the Big Bend. Here the fire is burning fiercely and is destroying a lot of fine timber.

Parties coming down from the Lolo Springs say that there are two or three large fires north and west of the springs that are sweeping through a lot of timber. It is not known how these fires north and west of the springs that are sweeping through a lot of timber started.

There have been no thunder storms for several days, so that lightning could hardly have done the work. It is likely the result of carelessness on the part of somebody camping or working in the timber. Everything is so dry that there is grave danger of serious spread of the fires.

There is another severe blaze reported on the hills across the river from Clinton, where a fire has been spreading for a couple of days.

### MORE HORSES FOR BRITONS

Billings Buyer Circulating Around the State in Search of Good Animals.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Dillon, Aug. 7.—J. M. Conway, a Billings horse buyer, is again in this section after saddle horses, and this time he will purchase 100 head, which will be shipped from Twin Bridges the first of next week.

Mr. Conway wants small horses, not to exceed 14-3, as, according to his contract, he can only put in one 15-hand horse in every seven.

He is having good luck in purchasing, quite a number of the horsemen of the county having been breaking horses of late especially for him.

The horses are for use by the British army in South Africa. Since the time the British officers learned that the Montana horse was the best animal that could be procured for the South African service Mr. Conway has been visiting different sections of Montana in search of horses suitable for the service.

During that time he has secured about 2,000 head and turned them over to the British agents at Billings. Of that number over 1,000 head came from this county and Madison.

Declines to Leave Town. (Special to Inter Mountain.) Billings, Aug. 7.—An attempt was made to force E. H. Girard, a plumber, to leave town because he had secured the ill will of the union men, but Girard declined to go, and says he will remain here as long as he pleases.

Ed. Dwyer's Father Dead. (Special to Inter Mountain.) Dillon, Aug. 7.—Edward Dwyer, shortstop for the Dillon baseball team, has received news of the death of his father, E. J. Dwyer, who passed away very suddenly.

Mr. Dwyer, Sr., was 68 years old and his death was caused by the excessive heat.
