TOO HANDY WITH A REVOLVER

Prizefighter, After Drinking Too Much Starts in to Depopulate Anaconda, But Is Prevented.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, Sept. 12.—"Silent" Rowan, prizefighter, is under arrest and in the county jail, charged with carrying concealed weapons, upon which charge he will be arraigned late today in Justice Frank Kennedy's court.

Rowan has a grievance against one Essinger, who is employed in the Vienna bakery. He began drinking yesterday, and procuring a gun, started out to wreak vengeance.

He went first to the office of the city attorney and then to the county attorney to get permission to kill Essinger. County Attorney Duffy was out, but John T. Casey was in. Rowan made known his wants in writing and drew his revolver.

The man with the gun was directly in front of the door, thus cutting off Mr. Casey's means of escape. He thought his time had come, and resigned himself to the inevitable.

This was the state of affairs when County Attorney Duffy arrived upon the scene, and probably saved Mr. Casey from an untimely death.

In company with Rowan, Attorney Duffy proceeded to Justice Kennedy's court, where Rowan again drew his revolver.

Constable Lynch then placed him under arrest, deprived him of his gun and took him to the county jail.

BACK FROM HIS EASTERN TRIP

Constable Lynch Talks of the Feeling in Chicago When President Was Shot.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, Sept. 12.—Constable Lynch returned yesterday from a trip to his old home in Canada. On his way back he stopped at the Buffalo exposition, leaving there the day before the attempted assassination of President McKinley.

Mr. Lynch was in Chicago when the news of the attempt on the president's life reached that city, and says that the entire city was in a state bordering on riot. "Anarchists made themselves scarce in Chicago that night," said Mr. Lynch, "and it is safe to say that if the crowds which filled the streets, waiting for news of the president's condition, had spotted one of the converts of Emma Goldman, there would have been murder done."

"The excitement is intense throughout the east and even now threats towards the anarchists can be heard on every side. Public opinion in the east lays the blame upon Emma Goldman and the anarchistic nest in and about Paterson, New Jersey."

NEW HOSPITAL FOR THE CITY

National Croation Society, With Headquarters in New York, May Erect One.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, Sept. 12.—The National Croation society, with headquarters in New York, has decided, it is said, to build a hospital in Montana for the benefit of the members of the society in this state, of whom there are 20,000.

The information issued from the main office is to the effect that there is already a fund of \$20,000 on hand with which to start the movement. The hospital will probably be located in Anaconda, it being a most convenient place and within the reach of all members of the society.

Into this hospital will be received for treatment, any member of a family Croation, needing medical treatment, the whole to be covered by the maximum fee of \$1.00 per month to be paid in regularity.

It is said the project has found favor with the Montana Croations and that 20,000 men have already pledged themselves to pay into the hospital fund the sum of \$1.00 per month, receiving in turn
