THRESHERS BUSY

HUM OF THE MACHINE HEARD IN GALLATIN VALLEY.

THIRTY BUSHELS TO THE ACRE

Large Forces of Men Employed on the Various Ranches, and Work Being Rushed as Fast as Possible.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Belgrade, Sept. 12.—Threshing machines are at work early and late in all parts of the Gallatin valley, threshing the fall grain.

Many new machines have gone from Belgrade and Bozeman for the season's work.

Most of these furnish and board their own crews and the farmers are not compelled to leave their fall work to follow the machines as formerly.

The spring rain is light in many localities on account of the continued drought during the summer.

Though it is yet difficult to tell what the wheat crop will average it is probable it will be about 30 bushels to the acre, which is 10 bushels lighter than usual.

The story flouting plant recently burned will be rebuilt, but at the best it will be too late to begin work on the new wheat crop. The grain bought by that firm will be stored largely in their elevator here.

Belgrade is a busy center of trade during this season of the year in groceries and supplies to the threshing crews.

During the past season more farming machinery has been sold here than ever before.

A road through the Flathead pass connecting east and west Flathead has been surveyed and when once completed will make an easier route to Bozeman, and will make Belgrade the nearest market.

This will be quite a material assistance to the town.

NO MORE ALASKA FOR HIM

T. T. Howe, Now in Billings, Declares Gold Excitement in the North is Dying Out.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Billings, Sept. 12.—A. T. Howe, who has traveled extensively in the western part of the United States and is well known in Montana, is spending a few days in Billings.

Mr. Howe has just returned from Nome, Alaska, and is on his way to Cripple Creek.

He says he has had enough of the Alaskan country and will never breathe the frigid air of that part of the earth again.

"The people of this country," said Mr. Howe, "have an exaggerated idea of the possibilities and chances for acquiring wealth suddenly in the Klondike country and other parts of Alaska.

While some of the adventurers have struck it rich yet about 80 per cent of those who left their home and friends to search for northern gold have come back empty-handed.

"The Nome excitement is dying out. When I left there in August people were swarming out of the place as rapidly as they could get away.

"In my opinion Alaska has seen her best days, so far as rich strikes are concerned, and my opinion is that the poor man who goes to that country now will strike a frost."

HEAVY SNOWS AND RAINS

Country Around Haystack Butte Experiences First Touch of Real Winter.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Augusta, Sept. 12.—The last week has been a stormy period in this region.

After nearly two months of practically rainless weather, the drought was broken Sept. 2 by a terrific hailstorm, which passed near Haystack Butte, devastating gardens and threshing out-uncut grain.

After the storm had passed the hail lay on the ground to a depth of three inches.

After more or less rain in the middle of the week a foot of snow fell on the foothills.

In the mountains it was much deeper, while on the prairie it gradually grew less as the distance from the mountains increased.

The outlook for the livestock interests of this section is better than before for many years on account of the heavy hay crops and the unusual supply of grass.

OFFICIALS WILL RAISE CHICKS

Men at the Montana Station Almost Ready to Begin the Raising of Poultry.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Bozeman, Sept. 12.—The poultry department of the experiment station, under the direction of Henry Gardiner, has been materially improved. Six lots have been fenced, graded and planted on one side of the new poultry rooms and three on the other.

These will be irrigated by means of a windmill from a dam above the yards and the chickens turned alternately from one set of lots to the other as the herbage becomes fit for them to pasture.

Brown Leghorns and Plymouth Rock breeds of chickens will be kept in stock. A shipment of Leghorns has been ordered from New York state and is expected in a few days.

Mr. Gardiner's intention is to get the department in shape to furnish the farmers and poultry raisers of the valley with eggs for hatching during the coming year.

The chicken industry is extensively cultivated on the grain farms of the valley, and the farmers will no doubt be only too glad to renovate their flocks with the new and blooded varieties furnished by the station.

ATTEMPT TO WRECK A TRAIN

Unknown Person Nearly Caused a Shocking Disaster Near Havre, Mont.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Havre, Sept. 12.—An unknown miscreant threw the switch of the railroad track running from the main line to the new round house, and the regular west bound freight coming in at 1 o'clock ran into a string of box cars and demolishing several of them.

The front of the engine was badly damaged. Both Engineer Anderson and Fireman Walsh jumped in time to save themselves from injury.

It was discovered later that several main line switches had been turned in this section of the railroad yards.

None of these switches has been locked. The pins holding them in place had been taken out and thrown away.

President James J. Hill's special, which was expected, would have been wrecked, as it would have been running fast at the point where the switch was turned.

INJURED IN A PECULIAR WAY

Young Hunter Who Kept His Knife in His Boot Sends the Blade Through His Foot.

Bozeman, Sept. 12.—Andy Reid, a son of a well known rancher of this valley, met with a peculiar accident while hunting in the West Gallatin basin.

He usually carries his hunting knife in the leg of his left boot for convenience.

One night he got up out of his bed to replenish his lamp fire.

He thought he would put on his boots to go and get a few more pieces of wood. When he pulled on the left boot, the point of the knife was pointing upwards and forgetting all about it he managed to send the blade clear through his heel.

He will have to give up his hunting trips for the remainder of this season.
