CLUB women of Butte are feeling jubilant over the success of the art committee of the clubs in securing seventy-six pictures to adorn the walls of the public school rooms. This committee is composed of the following women: Chairman, Mrs. W. O. Speer, of the Homer club; Secretary, Mrs. R. G. Young, of the Woman's club; Treasurer, Mrs. Clinton H. Moore of the Homer club; Mrs. T. W. Buzzo, of the Woman's and Homer clubs; Mrs. Green Majors of Woman's and Atlas clubs; Mrs. Geoffrey Lauzier, of the Homer and Woman's club; Mrs. Alice Stevens, of the West Side Shakespeare club.

Some time ago in speaking of art in the public schools one member of the board of education said that after all the talk at the last art exhibit he failed to see that the women accomplished anything. Now he will have to acknowledge that women have done much toward establishing art in the public schools. The presentation speech was made by Mrs. W. O. Speer and the gift accepted by Superintendent Young. A full account of the proceedings has already been published.

Nearly \$700 was spent on the pictures and all are handsomely framed and inscribed appropriately. This is only a start, for the women of Butte intend to have every school room in Butte, South Butte, and all suburbs adorned with works of art. The Executive Board of the Woman's Club met last Monday with the President Mrs. A. H. Wethey. There was a fair attendance for vacation time and important business was transacted. It was decided to hold the first regular meeting of the board on Monday, the 30th, the one of last Monday being special. There is every indication that the Woman's club will more than double in number this coming year.

Women generally have been disturbed by the suicide of frail little Annie Sullivan, who, goaded to madness by her brutal husband finally committed suicide. It was an unusual case, the wife and mother so terribly burned; the husband trying to get rid of her by rail-roading her to the insane asylum. That she was not insane was not any fault of the husband whose chief delight in life was to ill-treat his wife. When her sisters and friends rallied around her she was not insane, only ill and oh so terrified. So afraid that as he could not get rid of her by means of the law he would despite the law.

After Mr. Sullivan was arrested she brooded and brooded, the end being suicide. When he could no longer disturb her peace, the brutal husband was released from jail and proceeded to go through such a stage of intoxication he was practically the same terrorizer he has always been. Then he went to the house of death and proceeded to scare everyone into hysterics, ordering neighbors and relatives out of the house and would probably have demolished the coffin if he had not been placed under arrest.

The coroner's jury declared that he was morally responsible for his wife's death. Women generally lament that

there is no law to teach such men as Sullivan. There are many wifebeaters in Butte, scores of them and not one in fifty ever comes in contact with the law. In fact there does not seem to be any law to reach them. A fine, promptly paid and a double brutal beating for the wife. Not many wives are as tiny and frail as Annie Sullivan and so they drag on in a hopeless existence, many retaining such affection for their husbands they will not complain and if the neighbors do refuse to testify against their husbands. Few suicide.


An Enjoyable Recital.
