MUST STAY AT HOME

GREAT FALLS TEACHERS CANNOT ATTEND INSTITUTE.

FINANCES ARE FAR TOO LOW

Board of Education Says More Good Can Be Accomplished by Keeping the Educators at Work.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Great Falls, Sept. 23.—At the last meeting of the school board it was decided not to permit the teachers of the Great Falls school district to attend the teachers' institute, which will be held in this city next month. The board compliments Mrs. Kearns for the excellent program which she had prepared for the occasion and it was the sentiment of the meeting that, while much good could not fail to be derived from the institution by the teachers, the expense was so heavy in salaries, and the loss to the schools so important that the benefit derived by the teachers was not compensated.

In order to obviate the necessity of giving certain pupils but half a day's session, and to relieve the congested condition of some of the school rooms, it was decided to open four more rooms as soon as they can be gotten in readiness and to employ four additional teachers. Two of the new rooms will be located in the central building and two will be engaged in close proximity to the schools now suffering from overcrowding. Professor S. D. Largent reported that the parents of a large number of pupils had refused to have their children vaccinated, contrary to the order of the state and county boards of health in the matter, basing their refusal on the opinion of the attorney general, who has stated that the state and county boards had no authority for the issuance of the order.

The board will ask the county attorney for an opinion on the question as to whether or not it has the power to compel vaccination. More Trouble Over Sewers. (Special to Inter Mountain.) Bozeman, Sept. 23.—No work was accomplished on the sewers last week and Contractor Ryan failed to obey the instruction of the council to proceed with the work within 48 hours. He returned to Bozeman yesterday and from what can be learned he is going to make the council some kind of proposition looking toward an amicable settlement of the matter, or else he is about to begin suit to be absolved from his bond of \$5,000.

Freight Cars in a Wreck.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Miles City, Sept. 23.—Five cars immediately following the engine on freight train No. 53 were smashed in a wreck about 4 miles east of town, delaying traffic several hours. The origin of the trouble was a broken brake beam which caught on the ties and finally broke a truck. No one was injured, though a brakeman had just stepped from the last car that left the track on to the safe one. Dr. Matthews, who was a passenger in the caboose, was thrown on his face by the shock, but was only bruised a little on one leg.

Old-time Conductor Dead.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Glendive, Sept. 23.—William H. Fisher, an old-time freight conductor on the Northern Pacific railway, running out of Glendive, and later in the livery business in Glendive, died yesterday at his room in the Dion hotel. Spasmodic asthma was the cause of his death. He was 60 years old, and a widower. His former home was in Plymouth, Mich., and he has a brother living in Wayne, Mich., and a stepson, Charles Whipple, in Forsyth, Mont. There is \$600 in his credit in the bank here. At his own request he will be buried in Glendive.

Many Cases of Typhoid Fever.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Fort Benton, Sept. 23.—Typhoid fever cases are coming into the hospital here by the dozen, due, it is supposed, to the polluted wells at the railroad camp near Havre. The situation is becoming serious and steps will probably be taken by the authorities to remedy the evil. The same condition prevailed here at the railroad camp last year and drastic measures were taken by the authorities.

WILD DAVIE'S GLIMPSE OF CIVILIZATION AFTER 25 YEARS IN THE WOODS

"Wild Davie," scout, hunter, and one-time companion of the reckless adventurers who once peopled the west, was in Spokane, Wash., the other day after 25 years' continuous residence in the woods. He saw steam railroad trains for the first time in his life. The trolley car and the telephone were wonders to him. He walked on paved streets for the first time, and saw new wonders at every turn.

Two hundred miles from Spokane as the crow flies, deep in the heart of the Bitter Root mountains of Montana is Wild Davie's cabin. His trip to Spokane was made on snow shoes up hill and down, and, though Davie is 62 years old, he made the trip in six days, carrying gun and traps with him.

Only twice in the long quarter of a century that Davie has been buried in the woods with his dogs have visitors come to the valley where his cabin stands. Once in six months he has gone to an inland village, forty-one miles away, to get his mail and to dispose of the skins or wild animals which he has shot and trapped. He receives letters and papers from Scotland, but they are not addressed to him by his real name. He gets his ammunition on such visits, and among his dogs he has several animals that in an emergency can be sent to this postoffice through forty-one miles of lonely mountain trail, taking letters and bringing letters and small packages back.

At 12 years old this mountain recluse came from Dundee, Scotland. He lived in Quebec until he was 19 years old, then

moved to Philadelphia. In 1860 he went west.

His first experience was in Minnesota and the Dakotas, he having gone with a pack train for the Hudson Bay company into Manitoba and for several days engaged in trading looking glasses for the furs of northern tribes. Finally he became attached to a body on the boundary for smugglers.

But unrest seized him and he started out alone on foot, seeking civilization. Where Pembina, N. D., now stands he stopped and there was dreadfully hurt by a bear. Jim Bennett and Jack Schiller found him and nursed him back to health. The three men then joined, hunting and trapping through Missouri, Kansas and the Dakotas. At one time they had 100 trained dogs in a pack.

At Kennedy's trading post in Dakota the three men, who were members of the "Worshippers of the Rising Sun," spent one winter in the early '70s. One day they were initiating Kennedy into the order, having lots of fun, when they heard horses approaching. Two cavalrymen came up and threw themselves off their horses. One of these was General Custer and his attention was attracted to Davie because Davie's hair was several inches longer than Custer's.

Bennett, Schiller and Davie were engaged as scouts for Custer at that first meeting, acting for him until three days before the massacre.
