NATIONAL TRADE BALANCE.

The Inter Mountain is in receipt of the following communication: Butte, Mont., Sept. 28.—To the Inter Mountain:—In one of your recent editorials, entitled "The Country's Mighty Trade," I notice the total exports for the period named exceed the total imports by \$1,753,529,165.

There is no official information available giving in detail the relative value of the various items which make up the country's favorable trade balance.
