BRADY WAS A MODERN DEGENERATE OF THE WORST TYPE.

MANY CRIMES AT HIS HANDS

Long List of Law Breaking Incidents in the Career of the Helena Ravisher—Merited His Fate.

Boulder, Oct. 3.—That James Edward Brady, who was lynched in Helena yesterday, was a degenerate and merited his fate is the opinion of people here.

He was brought to Boulder from Whitehall last spring under the name of James Edwards and was tried for stealing a team and surrey from the Wade livery stable there, which he took as far as Logan and there abandoned. On his testimony that he was drunk and did not intend to steal the team the jury acquitted him.

He then got work on the Northern Pacific section, but was soon discharged, and it is believed that he turned a switch which derailed an engine soon after, but it could not be proved against him. He got a job as laborer at the brickyard here and during the summer seemed to be familiar with little girls. Now it comes out that he enticed four little girls with candy into his cabin and there took liberties with them, but probably not to the intent of criminality. He came near being summarily dealt with then, but was warned to leave town, which he did at once.

While here Brady pretended to get religion and joined one of the local churches, but later his name was dropped. Little is known of his antecedents, but his statement is correct that he has a niece, a blind girl, in the state school here. He went from here to East Helena.

DEACONESS HOSPITAL CLOSED

Great Falls Hospital Closes Its Doors Indefinitely and Custody Given to the M. E. Church.

Great Falls, Oct. 3.—The Deaconess hospital of this city was closed yesterday on an order from the board of trustees for an indefinite period. The hospital was formally opened two years ago last June and has a capacity of handling 30 patients.

For some time past there has been trouble among the nurses and physicians of the hospital and since the resignation of the head deaconess, Miss White, under pressure, a month ago or more, things have been getting steadily worse, and the trustees decided to close the hospital and hand it over to the home missionary board of the M. E. church to do with as they see fit in the future.

The custom granted the hospital since its opening has never been of a dividend paying nature and there has always been something of a suspicion since its erection that it was several years ahead of any of the requirements of the city. During the time that the building remains closed it will be entirely overhauled and refitted and put in better condition than ever before.

WRIT OF PROHIBITION REFUSED

Court Declines to Issue Writ Asked by Attorneys For Defendant in Gambling Cases.

Helena, Oct. 3.—The supreme court refused yesterday to issue a writ of prohibition asked for by the attorneys of the Butte men who were arrested for gambling. The object of the writ was to prevent the further prosecution of the men in Butte who were found guilty of a violation of the statute which prohibits gambling in this state.

The appeal of Milton Howell under sentence of death in Fergus county for the murder of Thomas Rosling, March 5, 1900, has been submitted to the supreme court.

The court set the Mitchell Furniture company case for next Monday.

The case of the state against Johnson, convicted in Butte of highway robbery, was also submitted.

RECOVERED LONG LOST HORSE

Deprived of a Valuable Animal For Years Owner Finds Him With Innocent Purchaser.

Twin Bridges, Oct. 3.—About two and a half years ago R. W. Page missed one of his best horses from his pasture, and all efforts to locate him had proven fruitless. Mr. Page had despaired of ever finding his horse, and its final discovery was a mere accident. While driving to Dillon last week he saw what he believed was his long-lost horse. Upon closer examination he was fully convinced and replevied him. The horse was in the possession of Mr. Doe, who claimed to be an innocent purchaser. The thief was apprehended and a warrant for him is out.

Charles Charlton died of old age Tuesday evening at the Pigeon house. Mr. Charlton was one of the earliest settlers of Madison county and was 84 at the time of his death. At one time he owned what is considered one of the finest ranches in Madison county, but his property had been fenced from him and he was left in straightened circumstances in his old age.

A message was received here late yesterday evening asking for medical assistance for Jack Jeffries of Silver Star. It was learned that Mr. Jeffries fell down a chute and fractured his right shoulder. It will be recalled that his brother Joe recently broke his leg while scuffling in the Bridges, and misfortune seems to have overtaken the family.
