IN THE EARLY DAYS

HOW VIGILANTES CLEANED UP A BAND OF HORSE THIEVES.

USED A ROPE WITH DESPATCH

Rounded Up a Band of Rustlers and Had Hangings by the Wholesale-- Chinaman Lynched in Butte.

"The last lynching that took place in Helena was in 1855 or thereabouts, when the vigilance committee took Con Murphy from the jail and hanged him from the cross timbers of a bridge over the city," said an early resident of the state today. "Murphy had not killed any one, so far as known, but he was considered a tough character and was troublesome. He had been accused of stealing horses and putting a bullet through the arm of a policeman who interfered with what he thought was the proper exercise of his prerogatives. After being arrested he broke jail, but was recaptured and hanged a day or two later. Prior to the hanging the Helena papers were full of the alleged doings of Con Murphy. In those days horse stealing was considered a serious offense. During 1854 and 1855 no less than 50 or 60 of those who had been appropriating the horses of others in the Powder river country were langed or shot by vigilantes in the employ of cattle companies. The thieves made that section their headquarters and drove off stock and cattle indiscriminately. The stockmen tired of the continual inroads on their herds and the cowboys did not like it. In 1854 the climax was reached by the organization of a large party of men to hunt down and kill the thieves. When they started out on their errand of destruction their movements were swift and can be likened unto the bursting of a dam. They landed on every rendezvous, killed all the men on the spot that failed to escape and pursued those who did get away until they were overtaken and sent out of the world. Some were followed hundreds of miles and killed. A few escaped entirely and left the country for good, knowing that their return meant death. The mortality record of that round-up was, it is alleged, 50 men--all hanged or shot, the majority of them slain as the vigilantes did not care to spend much time adjusting nouns and hunting for cross-pieces in a country where timber is scarce.

"So far as Butte is concerned, there have been more murders here than fist fights in Helena, but only one person has ever been hanged outside of the law. That person was a Chinaman, who had been accused of stealing a gold ring. The hanging was not the work of a vigilance committee, but two men, one of whom was afterwards arrested and sent to the penitentiary. The Chinaman was a work in the employ of some men who were placer mining along Silver Bow creek and at a point near where the Centennial brewery now stands. The Chinaman dealt having stolen the ring and the two men hanged him to a cross-pole of the cabin in which he had been employed."

Charles Lewis, a carpenter with a tragic history and mental troubles, is to be tried tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock in Judge McClellan's court on a charge of insanity. A complaint charging Lewis with insanity was lodged in the court by Deputy County Attorney Yancey today.

Lewis was arrested several days ago in a saloon where his erratic conduct impelled the proprietor to send in a call for help to the sheriff's office. He destroyed one of his eyes with a pistol-shot a year ago, in an attempt to kill himself, when he perforated his head with two pistol balls.

Of late, it is alleged, that he has been expressing the belief that there are mobs who desire to hang him. It is told that he lately declared that one of these mobs were hovering around the summit of Big Butte awaiting an opportunity to swoop down upon him.
