NIGHT IN A SALOON

EXPERIENCE OF A MAN WHO MET AN OLD FRIEND.

BOTH LOCKED IN A BARROOM

Called the Police and Proprietor by Telephone, Then Proceeded to Consume Part of the Stock.

"Many men have seen 'Ten Nights in a Barroom,' but probably few have had an experience that would so strongly remind them of the play as one I went through once," said Frank Smith of St. Louis this morning as he walked up to the bar in the Finlen.
